Railway from East Florenceville to Bridgewater.

To the Editors of the Carleton Sentinel : I have somewhat wordered that none of your numerous correspondents had responded the advisability of a branch railway being built from some point near East Florenceville to Centreville, hence to Bridgewater in Maine. I, with about this whole section of Maine. I, with about this whole section of country, can see nothing in the undertaking but success; the circumstances all appear favorable. A moderate outlay would fit the Florenceville bridge to carry a train; a fairly easy grade could be had either by the upper or lower creek at West Florenceville, or the Big Presque Is'e stream three miles below; the upper route would go by the low land to the north of Florenceville and west to Centreville, then by the valley of the Big Presque Isle stream to Bridgewater; or after crossing the St. John river then keep the bank for the said three miles, and turning up the valley said three miles, and turning up the valley of the Presque Isle so keep westerly to

The right of way would be free for some distance; I am inclined to think that via the distance; I am inclined to think that via the Presque Isle route the right of way would be freely given by the property holders, as it would generally be at the rear of the farms.

Now, view my chirographical sketch of the country through which this branch ought now to be running. The lovely St. John river is our eastern boundary. First on the western bank, like a rainbow in the heavens, sits West Florenceville, a thriving, handsome village, flanked for miles above and below by the most fertile upland in the Province, the land still maintaining this character west to the United States line and for some miles beyond. In this fertile belt, and about midway between the St. John and Maine boundary line, lies Centreville, well named, for she is the centre of an agricultural region that I doubt can be excelled this side of Ohio, ten miles to the north, south ad bb, eight miles between the St. John and United States boundary line searcely a hundred acre form miles between the St. John and United States boundary line, searcely a hundred acre farm that does not support a family and support them well. Centreville is on the great road, (No. 21 P plan,) leading from Bridgewater to the St. John river, and is a great feeder of the N. 


