DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN WINNIPEG. — Winni- peg, Man., March 1.—A fire broke out at an early hour this morning, in the baggage room of the Canadian Pacific railway depot here, and in a short time, notwithstanding the efforte of the fire brigade, the handsome structure was completely destroyed. The origin of the fire is a complete mystery. The building was beated by steam and the engine is 150 feet from it. The gas is, how- ever, kept burning in some of the offices, and it may have originated from this. Another theory is that some biggage in the baggage room gontained chemicals or seme other ex- plosive which, by some means, became ignited and started the fire.
