# Strikes.

Fortunately, although Canada has not en tirely escaped, there have been here few strikes of very extensive proportions. When we read of the frequent almost constantly recurring strikes which have occurred during the past few years in England and the United States, and particularly the latter and learn of the amount of loss to employers, laborers and workmen which has resulted; the misery that has attended them and the general demoralization and embarrassment occasioned. it seems passing strange that the class most directly and seriously affected, the workmer themselves, do not have their eyes opened t the worse than unwisdom of such organize demonstration. The loss pecuniarly to the laborers and others who have gone out upor strikes, in the United States, the last year, is something enormous. The strikes of th Chicago builders alone involved a loss to the strikers of two and a half millions of dollars. The shoemakers lost over \$5,000,000 and so an proportion have other trades lost. A fair day's pay for a fair day's work is right, and good workmen can generally command that; if they cannot it is usually because of the condition of business, and a bad matter i made worse when labor demands more than capital can afford to give.
