## Does it Pay?

Women toil and worry to raise and preserve, during the cold of winter, few or many plants, for the sake of the few buds or flowers which the plants afford, and partly for the sake of the very care and attention demanded. Then with a sigh of relief, in the summer, they turn their plants out into the garden, if they have one, to see the succeeding autumn to be restored to the windows.

The men, some with a taste for such things themselves and more inspired by the fancy and natural tendency of the taste of wives and daughters, begin as soon as "the frost is out of the ground" to prepare a garden plot—big or little as the case may be, and here their spare moments of morning and evening are devoted to the care and culture of shrubs and flowers. And people who thus engage, and still more freely those who care for none of these things, sometimes ask does it pay? If that question refers simply to a financial return for labor and money expended the answer an emphatic no! is easily reached. But fortunately even in this money seeking and money grasping age, this age when money is the one thing needed and the only sure "open sesame" for all things short of health and heaven, the better nature sometimes asserts itself and the actual percentage of profit on investment is forgotten. The women and the men who raise flowers do so because to them there is a pleasure in the pursuit, though the maximum is trouble and the minimum reward—because in the anxiety, watching and waiting for development, there is an agreeable relaxation followed by a more agreeable relaxation when the flowers and their hopes are matured; because of the cheap adornment afforded. And the small result pays them. But these are, without the intention, public benefactors. Every winter, presenting its beauty of greenery and blossom, every flower bed rich in colors of flowers either simple or rare, have a voice to and an effect on the passer by. They make more yet stronger appeal responded to by everyone that is affected by the beautiful; they minister to and cultivate the finer and better sensibilities; they affect individuals and thus in the aggregate result become public benefactors, refining the public taste and, it may be added, refining the public morals. Thus in the broader and better sense it does pay!

## Expansions of Great Britain.

A recent writer points out, in a comparison of the Victorian and previous expansions of Great Britain, that—

There have been four periods of expansion in England—the time of the movement of the reformers, the outbreak of civil liberty in the seventeenth century, the steps taken toward the formation of greater Britain in America and India a century ago, and the peaceful expansion of English life which has spread all over the world since Victoria became Queen of England. The comparison of these in the way of race development shows the growth of a constantly widening life. The loss of the American colonies a century ago, the greatest misfortune which England met with in her colonial enterprises, but this has been more than made up in the rapid expansion of this country under the influence of institutions which have freely and happily responded to the demands made upon them. The English nation lost territory, but the English race greatly gained in power and force by the free range which for a hundred years English ideas thus secured on American soil.

What antedates the political thinker today is that England has quietly taken the position of universal empire. Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, and a large part of North America are now a part of the English realm. The plan of federation, whether the sanguine dreams of its promoters are realized or not, has a certain impressive character, and awakens the brooding that increases British power. At home, as Prof. Seeley pointedly remarks, there is a greater field of power than ever, even though the gigantic shadow of ill constantly attend its stride; but abroad, as Mr. Froude has shown in the account of his tour through the colonies, there is "no gradual ripening of intolerable abuses, no growth of irritation and alienation toward war and disruption." The picture of greater Britain is unique. To use Prof. Seeley's glowing words: "What we trace is a proper development, new communities desiring for themselves institutions, now subdividing for convenience, and understanding for mutual help, without fostering religious discord, without commercial grievances, without stain of slavery, and all under one benign master empire!" This colonization of the world is the greatest of the age, and the light of the hour they are the fairest portion of the British empire.
