It appears that the total revenue in Canada, for the eleven months of the fiscal year passed, was \$31,132,087, or an increase over the revenue of the corresponding period last year of \$1,446,231. The expenditure was \$29,236,363 leaving a surplus in the eleven months of \$1,865,742. The Finance Minister in his budget speech contemplated a deficit of \$300,000; at present it looks as if he would be favorably out in his reckoning.
