



They are not up to time, not punctual, come when they like, absent themselves when they choose, and if they are going into the country for a visit fail to provide several grades of Conventions receive careful a substitute and never let the superintendent know of their intentions. Under such circumstances how can we expect to draw. We must mpress with the thought that we are in earnest. The second thought or influence is, to have comething for them when they come. This covers the study of the lesson. What we want is thorough study and understanding of the lesson. There is a great deal of nonsense and twaddle taught in the school. My little girl coming home from school (not in Woodstock,) tells me what the teacher has taught her about her being good—a good girl—if she was bad she would go to hell. This is sheer nonsense.
