## Temperance at St. Francis.

To the Editors of the Carleton Sentinel:

Within a year past a great change has

taken place in St. Francis, on the Maine side

of the St. John. This is due partly to the

enforcement of the Maine Law and partly to

the influence of the Roman Catholic priest

who has been very active in putting down the

traffic in strong drink. When I speak of

St. Francis, I mean a district on both sides of

the St. John, six miles in length, from the

mouth of the St. Francis down about one

third of the population being of English de-

cent, and the rest of French.

It is not for me to say what has been, be-

cause I should speak mostly from report, but

I can say, on the Maine side of this district

no liquor is sold; no yelling and

drunken rowdiness; no yelling and

screaming in the dead of night; no drunken

men staggering in the streets.

Now we want our friends on the Province

side to be encouraged not to drink rum, but

to hope that what has been done for this

side can be done for that. A commencement has

been made already. The magistrates are en-

forcing the License Law, and the women are

"putting their foot down." When a woman

"puts her foot down" we expect to see some

thing done. Some of these I have talked

with, and have been greatly encouraged by

their zeal and determination in the good

cause. They are very interested parties,

and some having suffered from the

liquor traffic. Our forty pledged abstin-

ent carried high and dry on terra firma on

the crest of one huge temperance wave

remain just where they were carried while

the wave has receded, to show what God

Almighty can do in a little while. But the

best of all is the rum is not leaving alone.

It is carrying with it tobacco and profanity.

I went away from this temperance tract

and returned temperance and anti-tobacco

much on this point because we have talked

such a free and easy time. We accord the

right of private judgment to each other and

let every man be true to his conscience. We

have a few who don't want to drink rum, but

we use profane language. This is a move in

the right direction, and we hope others will

follow.
