the case: "The customs duties form that part of the general taxation in which every one must more or less take part, as the articles from which the excise duties are almost entirely derived, viz., wines, spirits and tobacco, are luxuries and their use optional." I find that from 1881 to 1885, we, in New Brunswick, paid for each man, woman and child, exclusive of luxuries—\$4.25 per head. I find that for, a like period we paid for wines, spirits and tobacco, etc., on an average \$1.93 per head. "A Farmer" tells you that the

New Goods at unheard of low prices are luxuries not produced in the County. In 1885, New Brunswick paid into the Dominion revenue upwards of \$1,633,400 as taxes. Out of that vast sum, nearly twice the net debt of the Province, only \$208,650 was made up by taxes on luxuries-about oneeighth. It will be vain for any man to distort the facts in such a way as to show the farmers don't pay the vast majority of the taxes. They compose the great majority of the people. It is for their use mainly that the goods on which we pay duty are imported into this County, and they are the men who pay the duties. Look at the amount of duti-able goods imported into this country: in 1883, \$100,827,816; in 1884, \$88,349,492 goods, consisted among other articles, of

Your correspondent makes some extraordinary statements for one who is so ready to call the statements of others absurd, He says the duty collected in 1885 on cigars amounted to \$335,274 Vanceboro; and from Bangor, Portland, Boston, and all points West; Houlton, of cigars and tobacco in 1885 only amounted to \$414,550. He says the duty collected on ale and beer amounted to \$196,284; the

fact is that the importation of beer and ale only amounted to \$191,779. On fruits and nuts he says the duty amounted to \$1,601,-352; why, rir, the total value of all the fruits and nuts imported into this country in 1885 did not exceed that amount. He says that the duty is only 10 cents greater per head in 1885 than 1884, and amounts to \$4 29 per head.
