As to Belyea's offer to trot "Bloodstone," I will say that "Bloodstone" will not be three years old until the seventeenth day of June next and has never been driven but very little, and I have never claimed that he could beat any body's horse, therefore I will not maich him against any colt or filly a year older, lest he too should become curbed in his effort to win the boquet or ribbon. I say boquet or ribbon because those are the only two things, owing to my low state of finances I would consent to make a match for, were I disposed to accept the

match for, were I disposed to accept the onesty to say that he took the words "for a boquet or ribbon" from a challenge which a gentleman had previously issued and not give the public the idea that they were first conceived in his own mind. His reference to Mr. Atherton was entirely uncalled for; it does not lie in the mouth of Belyea to say anything against him. Mr. Atherton has been engaged in the business of horse train-
