

The Province is about 20,000 square miles in extent, and is, therefore, about two thirds the size of Ohio. It is one of the Maritime Pro-

rinces of British America, its northeastern, eastern and southern borders being washed by Bay Chaleur, Northumberland Straits and the

The whole of its western border is covered by the State of Maine. In the northern part, where it borders on the Province of Quebec, the population is largely French, and, to the same extent is Roman Catholic in religious faith. In one of its counties, Madawaska, only a single Protestant Sabbath School could be heard of. On its eastern and southern borders, the nationality is principally Scotch or English, while on the west the population is, in language and life, much the same as in Maine and the rest of New England, with whose people there is very free intercourse, socially and commercially. The winters are long and severe, but the summers are delightfully pleasant. It was thought best at this time not to say much about the Chautauqua Normal Union, but to go forward seed sowing on that line, and another year, perhaps, press the matter of the organization of classes for study. Notwithstanding that, however, the assemblages were everywhere gratifying, in some instances overflowing the churches in which held.
