OUR OTTAWA LETTER. (From Our Own Correspondent.)

OTTAWA, June 19. Senator Clemow, of this city, has a great scheme hatching beneath his massive brow. He will move next session to erect a Federal District of Ottawa after the fashion of the United States District of Columbia. The idea is to draw a line 10 or 12 miles out from Ottawa and enclose the city in a circle this distance, at all points, from the Parliament Buildings. HALF A CENTURY AT A DOOR. It is a saying that civil servants seldom die and never resign. Michael II. Naughton, inner door keeper to the Privy Council has just celebrated the fittieth anniversary of his prointment to this post. For half a century this tall, erect, and stern guardian of State secrets has seen many public men and many ministries pass away; it has been all one to him. His age is seventy. The first Governor he served under was Sir John Colborne.

On July 1 postoffices in Canada will be divided into two classes, money order offices which will continue to render accounts to the Department, and non accounting offices which will render no accounts. Hereafter his postmester will not retain salary from the receipts for postage etamps; it will be paid to him direct from the Department.

As Mr. McLelan was a conspicuous failure as Finance Minister it is only fair to him to say that he has been the most industrious and reforming Postmaster General since Confederation. This is the tribute of officials of the Department with whom I have spoken.

The unostentatious demeaner and friendly bearing of Lord Stanley has favorably im-pressed the people of Ottawa accustomed as we were to Lord Lansdowne exacting all the homage due to a Viceroy.
