

Mr. Blair and the Fisheries-What the Blair Government Have Done. To the Editors of the Carleton Sentinel

Mr. Blair, in his opening address to the jury at Andover the other day, entered into a discussion of the fisheries and the action of the Local Government in respect to them. He said: "The only thing the Legislature of the province has done at all, affecting the fisheries on any of our rivers, has been to authorize the Government of the day to lease the ungranted crown lands upon proper, public, and open competition, instead of, as was formerly the system, to sell those rights away from the crown absolutely and forevermore."

Now, that sounds very trivial. One without thoughtfully considering the matter might be led to think the action of the Local Government unimportant. In committing the bill relating to the fisheries, to the House of Assembly, in 1884, Mr. Blair said: "The bill bad in contemplation the withholding from grants all the lands belonging to the crown, bordering on fishing rivers, and forming a fisheries on any of our rivers, has been to reserve for the purpose of leasing all the non-tidal waters." It follows that under this law no man can obtain the crown land on the rivers. One of the chief objects of the bill, as declared by Hon. Mr. Blair and other members of the Assembly at the time of its adopbers of the Assembly at the time of its adoption, was the protection of the fisheries, notwithstanding the fact that the protection, regulation and control of the fisheries rests solely with the Dominion Government. Now Mr. Blair stated that the greater part of the fishing rights on the Tobique belonged to the New Brunewick Railway Co. But the facts are that what did belong to the crown were

also leased to gentlemen identified with the New Brunswick Railway, and whether the fishing rights of the Tobique belonged to the N. B. R. or not does not affect the present iaw. If not one foot of land on the Tobique was owned by the N. B. R., it would have, under the law, been leased to private parties, as proved by the fact that the Government have leased all they control on that river. There is a great difference in a Government There is a great difference in a Government exercising a right and private parties exercising that right. The Government are responsible to the people for the faithful fulfilment of their trust. Private parties exercise their right for their own benefit and are—in respect to the fisheries—practically responponeible to no one for a period of five years. The protection of the fisheries, their regulation and control, rests, under the constitution, with the Dominion Government. But under the plea of protecting the fisheries, with which the Local Government has nothing to do, Mr. Blair and his colleagues have ling to do, Mr. Blair and his colleagues have ing to do, Mr. Blair and his colleagues have banded over for a mere pittance all the fishing rights of the province to monopolists for a period of five years, and what is the result? These wealthy men come in here, with an exaggerated sense of their rights, backed by great wealth and the power of our own Government, they trample upon our own people and assume to execute our laws, with the sad and awful results which have taken place on the Tobique. The whole trial of the murder

case at Andover is an illustration of what sad results necessarily follow the mistaken policy of placing interests of the people in the hands of monopolists. Mr. Blair and his colleagues had ample warning as to what would likely be the result of the adoption of such a law; they were told that "To go to such an ex-treme as to place the fishing rights in the hands of those who purchase them by reason of their wealth, was of that class of legislaof their wealth, was of that class of legisla-tion that, in Europe, was producing social revolutions—producing evils in civilization that men, despairing of obtaining their rights by legislation, are adopting courses that tend to reduce everything to chaos." This law tends to retard the opening up and develop-ment of this country by promoting the settle-ment of the land along the rivers. It places the rights of the many exclusively into the bands of the few. It tends to produce that worst of all results—the farming-out of the worst of all results-the farming out of the rights of the people, by private and irrespon-eibie parties, for the purpose of making money; and, if this mistaken policy is con-tinued, there is good cause to fear that the terrible results which have taken place on the Tobique are but a prelude of what is still

the Tobique are but a prelude of what is still to come. Our people are too accustomed to freedom to be trampled upon with impunity and the Government may rest assured that they will be held responsible for the oppression which they have brought about, by selling for a mere pittance the rights of the people. Mr. Blair spoke of the former practice of selling the fisheries "absolutely and for evermore," which formerly obtained. He took good care to say nothing about the proposition which he and his Government entertained two years ago of selling out "absolute." tained two years ago of selling out "absolute-ly and forevermore" all the fishing rights the most valuable fishing river in the province, viz., the Restigouche. The Government were offered \$100,000 for the fishing istration which will entertain such a propo-

sition and seek to carry it into effect?
