**OUR OTTAWA LETTER.**  
(From Our Own Correspondent.)

OTTAWA, April 31.—The debate on Sir Charles Tupper's Budget speech in progress in the House of Commons. The main features of the main features of Sir Charles' statement which is the most important item of business in all sessions.

**THE LAST FISCAL YEAR.**  
The total revenue for the year ending 30th June, 1887, were \$35,754,093 or an increase over the estimate of \$455,000. The estimated expenditure for that year was \$36,000,000, leaving a deficit of \$245,907. The actual expenditure only exceeded the estimate \$57,800 and the deficit of \$300,000 has been turned into a surplus of \$57,800.

**THE FISCAL YEAR TO COME.**  
Taking the fiscal year beginning July 1st next he estimated the revenue as follows: Customs, \$22,500,000; Excise, \$6,400,000; Miscellaneous, \$7,750,000 or a total estimated revenue of \$36,650,000.

The estimate made before Parliament opened to \$35,421,440, but no sums have been included for mail subsidies or steamship subsidies. The amounts for these services and the supplementary charges, as to be brought down, added to the \$35,421,440 will be thought just about balance the revenue of \$36,650,000.

The interest on the Public Debt, \$10,065,000, shows an increase of \$116,000. We are in debt in England for temporary accommodation to the extent of \$1,000,000. Sir Charles alluded to the financial stringency of last Summer, the short crops in Ontario, and the bad effect of unusual lowness of the market on the lumber industry, and said that by economy and prudent Canada would soon recover from the present stringency, and warned merchants against over-importation.

By the withdrawal of the larger deposits from the Savings Banks, the capital account had to be met out of ordinary revenue and the Government had to meet the deficit in England already mentioned, and it will be necessary to make a further loan as soon as the exact amount required is ascertained.

Sir Charles ended his business statement here and I will give the salient points of the latter half of his speech.

No tariff changes are to be made as permanent in the fiscal policy is necessary to induce the investment of capital.

The average duty on United States imports is 47 per cent, as against 25 per cent. in Canada.

The iron duties imposed last year have been generally approved. Consideration has been given to the question of a general reduction of duties on iron and steel.

The fisheries treaty has dispelled a dark cloud on our horizon. A duty on steel rails is not at present advisable.

It is madness and folly to discuss unrestricted reciprocity as the Americans would not grant it even if we adopted it.

His statement of the American offer of greater freedom of trade but did not commit him to it as to details.

A policy of reciprocity would be ungrateful to England.

**SIR RICHARD CARTWRIGHT'S SPEECH.**  
Sir Richard Cartwright said Sir Charles' talk about unrestricted reciprocity was incoherent rubbish. He said that Sir Charles' offer at Washington of unrestricted reciprocity Sir Richard said he thought Sir Charles' desire the wholesale alteration in our policy under circumstances were too strong for him. Dealing with the Budget Sir Richard made these points:

The deficit for last year of \$300,000 had been changed into a surplus of \$97,000 by crediting the receipts from Dominion lands to income and charging the expenses of managing these lands to capital. This was wrong and the actual deficit was \$348,907.

Sir Charles' admission of a deficit of \$1,000,000 in 1887 was a serious one especially as he made no provision to meet it.

From the Budget Speech it is evident that our annual income stops at \$36,000,000 and our annual annual expenditure has reached \$37,000,000.

There are additional heavy liabilities coming up such as the absorption of Newfoundland, which will be a charge of half a million annually, and the demand of the Province for \$1,500,000 increased subsidies which if capitalised will add \$40,000,000 to our debt.

The terms of settling the C. P. R. monopoly will add an annual charge of \$225,000 for 50 years, and new demands would be made.

The present Government have added \$40,000,000 to the taxes paid on the people in direct and indirect ways.

The relative expenditure of Canada is greater by far than that of England or the United States.

In conclusion Sir Richard moved in amendment to the motion to go into Supply that the debt of Canada in 1878 was \$140,000,000 and in 1888 \$225,000,000; that the annual expenditure was \$22,500,000 and now it is \$36,650,000; that the present system of taxation is unjust and shows a pronounced bias in favor of the rich; and that the House is of opinion that any considerable addition to the debt and taxation will work hardship and place us at a disadvantage to the people of the United States besides prejudicing our chances of securing improved commercial relations with the people of that country.

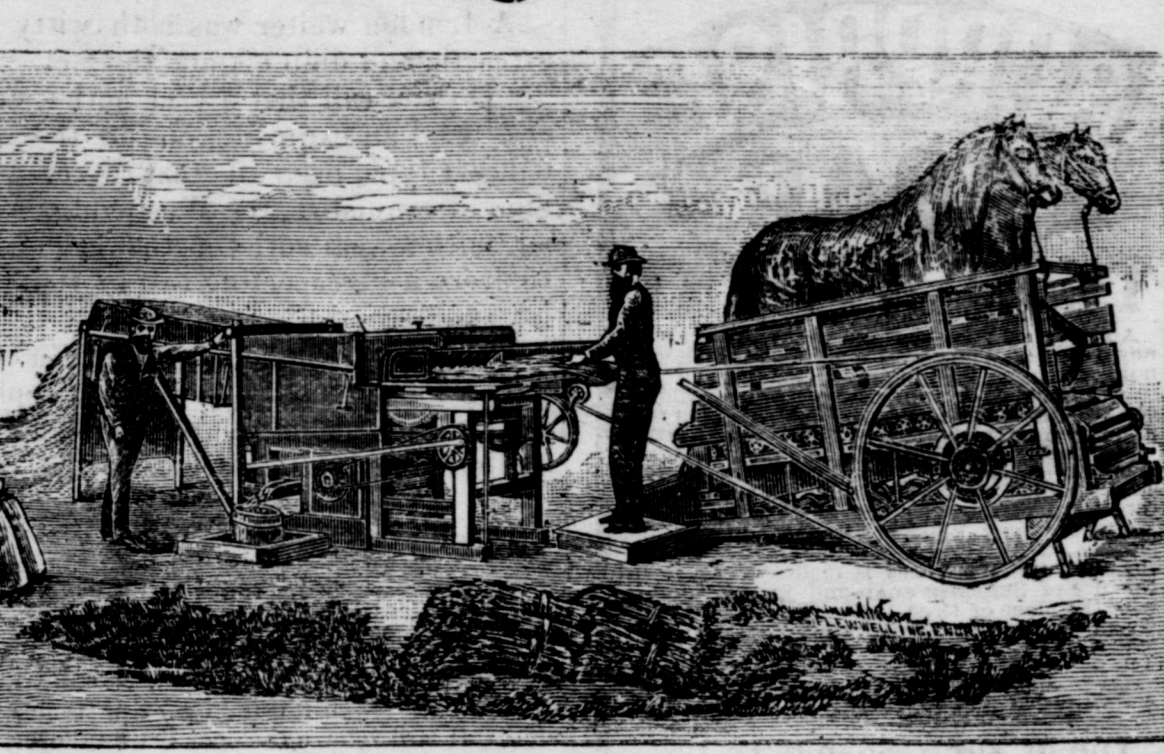
