Death of a Carletonian.

To the Editors of the Carleton Sentinel:

Permit me in your paper to record the death of one more of our Carleton County boys, who left his home to seek riches in the far West, Joseph M. Maddox. In company with his cousin, J. H. Faulkner, the deceased left his home and went to Minnesota, in November last, where they spent the Winter and up to July, when they went with the Elevator Company to build elevators in the Northern part of Dakota. When in Omdurgen he was taken sick, but no serious result was feared. He was removed to Larimore, where with his step-son and cousin he had the best of care, and on the 24th inst. he died of a paralytic stroke, and died on the 25th. He was laid in the Presbyterian cemetery and had, what many in his country would regard as a Christian burial. His friends will take his remains home in December.

Eight Wonder of the World.

Elk Point, Dakota, Sept. 28, 1888.

You will observe the date that I am away out in what was formerly known as the "Far West." My visit in Cincinnati, Ohio, was of a very pleasant character. The centennial of Ohio and the Central States, now being held in the city of Cincinnati, is certainly very grand. Coming to Chicago, my stay in that city was made very pleasant by R. D. Shipman, Esq., one of the richest men in the city, and uncle to Dr. D. Rogers of your town (Woodstock). Arriving at Sioux City, Iowa, I found the Corn Palace. "The eighth wonder of the world," already open. The Corn Palace, of October 1887, was a magnificent proof of Sioux City's boundless resources and possibilities. Sioux City, to give the idea of having a Harvest Jubilee and out of this grew the artistic triumph known to the world as the "Corn Palace." It was distinctively a "Sioux City idea," and in the successful materialization of this idea, the city has proven her claim to it for all time, and may proudly claim to be the "Corn Palace city of the world." The building was 210 feet long, 100 feet deep, and the general contour, Moorish. President Cleveland said of it: "This is the first new thing that has been shown me." Chas. M. Dapew, of New York, said: "I have been all over the world lately, and have seen all the natural and man-made curiosities, but never before saw a Corn Palace." The Palace of 1888 is a frame building, 150 x 150 feet. It covers exactly one quarter of a block. The main wall of the sides is 30 feet high. Rising from each corner of the building is a double tower, 32 feet square, fronting to each side, and projecting upwardly 10 feet from the main wall, and rising to a height of 50 feet from the ground line. Midway on each side of the building, between the corner towers, is a smaller tower, projecting only 6 feet outwardly from the main wall. Under each of these middle towers on the ground floor is an ample exit. Rising above the double tower is an octagonal tower 115 feet in height. The diameter of the octagonal tower is 24 feet. Springing from the inner line of the almost flat roof over the gallery, which is 50 feet wide, and standing at a perpendicular elevation of 6 feet clear above that line, rises the roof from each side into a wonderful fairy scene of indescribable beauty and artistic arrangement.

The Tobacco Tragedy.

To the Editors of the Carleton Sentinel.

Will you please publish a few facts on the Tobacco tragedy which should be known:

The trial of the prisoners indicted for the murder of Mr. M. E. L. H. H. has occasioned a great deal of excitement in this vicinity during the last few days. The court house has been crowded day after day, and wonderful sympathy has been manifested on behalf of the prisoners who are generally believed by those who best know them to have done the fatal deed unintentionally. Major Howard and his party also have many sympathizers with them in their sad bereavement, and I much question if any are more sorry than the young man who fired the deadly shot. Had the whole truth on both sides been known at the time of the trial and the law properly administered, the punishment of the prisoners would be easier, and more would be spared therefor. I had a long talk with the prisoners after leaving Andover, and they told me what they knew concerning the sad affair. It was apparent to me, who heard Mr. Howard's testimony before the Coroner's Jury, and again at the trial, that he endeavored to make a good case for himself. His evidence on those two occasions did not agree, and the boys say that he did not abide by the truth which they knew as well as he. He said they fired only three shots the previous night, but four shots were fired. He said these were fired up river in an opposite direction, away from the men in the canoe, but the truth is they were fired toward them and one shot struck the water not more than six feet from the bow of their canoe. He said only one canoe was put out, but there were two, and persons in one of them besides the one paddling. He swore that he spoke mildly to the men, but the reverse is the case; in severe tones he ordered them to "stop that paddling," and stated that there was an "officer of the peace there." The young men put their lights and escaped for their lives. Lincoln swore that he saw the spear, which Traflet says was an impossibility, which was the impression at the trial. The prisoners did not think there was any intention on the part of the Howard to kill, or even hurt, only frighten, and that was their intention the next morning, but they placed too much confidence in their shooting ability. They did not know of Mrs. Howard's death until after they went home. All who know the boys, and Traflet especially, give them a good character and, therefore, hope they may win the good will of the authorities and through good behavior soon be returned to the bosom of their friends. Sin must not go unpunished, but we sympathize with the boys who meekly submit to their lot, while they know that the party who started the trouble's worthy of greater punishment for breaking the law, Sabbath breaking of the worst kind, &c. We have plenty of law, but little justice. The judgment of all the earth will do right. We judge our prayer with those of their many friends that all hope may not be crushed out of their opening lives.
