## Drinking Ice Water.

That cool refreshing drinks in warm weather are delicious is undeniable. That drinking ice water in copious draughts is a person overheated is undeniable, not to say dangerous, is also undeniable. But that the free drinking of water in some form or other must be avoided, is undeniable, and is one of the greatest popular errors extant. ## Dr. Mackenzie and Press Statements.

Dr. Mackenzie, in an interview at Venice, totally denied the accuracy of the interview published in the *Dutch Dagblad*, in which he was represented as admitting that he had contracted the cancerous nature of Empress Frederick's malady in order to prevent a regency. Dr. Mackenzie said that he was glad to leave Berlin, where his movements were closely watched. "Empress Victoria," he said, "was surrounded by spies. After the death of Emperor Frederick I was confined at Potsdam for several hours. Emperor William's conduct was odd altogether. I almost think his mental malady had affected his brain. I can say nothing of the late Emperor's memoirs. It is untrue that Queen Victoria carried them off. Whoever did will create a sensation when he publishes them. Besides Frederick's diary, they contain a series of letters from leaders of the German Liberal party, sketching the policy they hoped Emperor Frederick would have adopted had he lived. Empress Victoria has not yet come to a decision as to her future residence. She has an income of £40,000, of which £5000 is derived from England. She will be obliged to make Germany her nominal residence, and will visit Berlin every year."

## Christianity in Japan.

The proclamation of Christianity as the national religion of Japan will, probably, soon be made. The question, according to the *Japan Weekly Mail*, is now under discussion, and many of the leading publicists, statesmen and professors are taking an active part in the discussion. It is not claimed that Christianity doctrine, in its purely religious sense, is generally acceptable, but it is claimed that Christian civilization and Christian sentiment are gaining the mastery; that the old Japanese beliefs are doing or dying fast; that Japanese ethics are gradually giving place to Christian ethics; that Christianity has, among other things, this in its favor—that it is the religion of the most highly civilized countries.
