In Central Missouri, \$450,000 worth of damage has been done by a recent storm.

Major General Schomburgk has been placed by the President in command of the U. S. army.

For the first time, a Jew has been raised to the rank of Major General in the Belgian army.

Manitoba has elected 10 farmers as members of its Assembly out of 38, its entire number.

The grape crop of California, this year, is the largest ever known. In France the crop has failed.

Viscount Hinton, eldest son of the Earl of Paulet, plays a street organ in the suburbs of London.

Francis Murphy, the celebrated temperance lecturer, begins a campaign in St. John on Sunday, Sept. 24.

An English syndicate is purchasing all the breweries in Canada in the United States, where the establishments are worth \$250,000.

An official return shows that, in 1877, 32 persons died of starvation in London. This is the richest and most Christian city of the world.

In Chicago, on two streets, are more murders and numerous assaults committed on each Sunday than in the whole of Canada in a year.

Three United States vessels of war have been dispatched to Halifax harbor to watch the Canadian cruisers which are watching the fishermen.

The exports from Ottawa to the United States last year were nearly \$3,000,000, an increase of over \$200,000 above those of the previous year.

Business failures last week in the United States were 205, in Canada, 27, being 53 less than the total of failures in the corresponding week of last year.

Juan Perez, of Mexico, a noted robber, will probably be hanged. He has confessed to eight murders and wounding twelve persons whom he robbed.

At Wolverhampton, Eng., eight was restored to a blind man by a flash of lightning reflected on the spectacle which he wore to conceal his disfigurement.

It is stated that, in consequence of the drought, cattle are being sold in Kingston, Ont., for shipment to the United States, at from \$5 to \$12 per head.

Of the convicts in the state prison, Massachusetts, 378 were born in the United States; 58 in Ireland, 35 in Canada, 32 in England, 8 in Italy and 6 in Germany.

C. H. McCormick, son of the great reaper maker, himself ran at the head of the machinery in Chicago, has a fortune of \$4,000,000. He is only 29 and unmarried.

Hon. Mr. Blake has arrived in Canada and gone to Murray Bay, in hopes of improving the condition of his health which has not, by any means, been restored by his European trip.

The other day half stones as large as hen's eggs fell for an hour in Minnesota, beating down roofs, breaking down houses and barns, killing cattle and rendering many persons senseless.

Hon. J. G. Blythe has returned to America and has delivered several political addresses in response to enthusiastic receptions tendered him at various points on his journey from New York to Maine.

The big raft from the Juggins, N. S., containing 21,300 spruce logs, or 3,000,000 feet of lumber, has safely reached its destination, New York. It would have required 45 lumber schooners to transport it.

A train at Flood, a Catholic priest, got off a train at Flood on Long Island, but just as he landed, a glare of lightning so dazzled him that he fell under the wheel; both legs were cut off and he died next day.

A reservoir belonging to Menz's brewery, Valparaiso, burst at 8:30 o'clock, Saturday last. The principal streets of the city were flooded and traffic suspended. It is supposed upwards of 200 persons were drowned.

The government of the colony of Victoria proposes houses to the extent of \$1,250,000, extending over several years, as encouragement to the farming industry, by encouraging dairying. About \$50,000 for technical instruction in farming.

The death rate in the Dominion for the past year in the cities named, is thus stated: Halifax has a little over 18 per thousand of the population, compared with 30 per thousand in Montreal, 28 in Quebec, 22 in Ottawa, 19 in Toronto, 21 in St. John and 24 in Winnipeg.

Fifty-one millions of acres of land, in different sections of the United States, is now sought to recover to the general government, the same having been granted to railway companies which have failed to carry out the conditions on which the grants were made. The report of the Railway Mission—of which the Earl of Aberdeen is President—for the year ending April 30, says there are 36 branches in London, 185 in the provinces, 12 in Wales, 21 in Scotland and 10 in Ireland, making 246 in all, of which 74 have been formed during the year.

On Wednesday last week, a ship load of 300 Italians left New York for Italy. They had come to America, this Summer, misled by information they had received as to the high rate of wages paid. They came to find sad disappointment and, disheartened, they have gone back to a hard life at home, but not so hard as that which offered in New York.

Russell Sage, the Wall Street speculator, although an old man, has not a wrinkle on his face and is as well preserved as a man of 50 years. He explains his good health thus: "I do not worry. No matter how perplexing business affairs may be I simply ignore them. I keep them in my mind, but I am very fond of horses, and when I go from my office I get behind a pair of trotters and spend my mind on my admiration for them and their good points. I believe this is one of the best cures for nervousness that any man can have."

On Saturday last, writs of arrest were served upon Edinburgh news agents for £20 each at the instance of Parnell, against the proprietor and printer of the London Times, and for jurisdiction. This is the practice in Scotch law to enable a foreigner to sue in Scotch tribunals. Hence it is obvious that Parnell intends to prosecute the Times in the Scotch courts. Parnell has retained J. B. Balfour, formerly lord advocate of Scotland, to conduct his suit in the Scotch courts against the Times. Strachan has been retained as counsel.

Prof. Eliza Gray, of Highland Park, Ill., has obtained letters patent, dated July 21, 1888, for a combination of instruments called the telegraph, consisting of a transmitter and a receiver, and designed for transmitting messages by wire between distant points by the sender in his own handwriting, thus doing away with skilled operators. The invention is based on the discovery of a new principle in controlling the electric current, whereby a pulsatory current is produced—having been based on the use of a variable current.

Fishery Treaty.
It is now believed that the Democrats in Congress have decided to surrender in the matter of the Fishery Treaty. A vote will be taken and it will be rejected by about 24 to 22.

Newfoundland Credit.
The financial credit of Newfoundland, notwithstanding the stories that have been published in the last two years about the poverty prevailing on that island, appears to be high. A loan has recently been placed in London for \$500,000 at 5 per cent. and commended a premium of 5 per cent. The offerings for the loan were twice as large as required.

A Laughing Crowd.
In a car load of passengers on a Pennsylvania railroad, recently, all the occupants might have been observed giggling, laughing and strangely grimacing. Presently the conductor entered and almost immediately he fell into a seat, a victim to the general hilarity. After the windows had been opened it was ascertained that a vessel containing laughing gas, being carried by a physician on board, had become unworked, and the gas escaped with the consequent result.

Very Suitable.
It is not generally known that there is a prayer meeting in connection with the British House of Commons. In the room of Colonel Legge, the Deputy Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, within the precincts of the House, a prayer meeting is held weekly during the time the House is in session. According to the *Birmingham Post*, Sir John Kenway, Mr. Samuel Smith, one of the members for Liverpool, and Mr. Henry Wilson are among the regular attendants, and take their share of the work. No similar service is held in connection with the House of Lords.

O. of R. C.
The conductors on the N. B. Ry. belonging to the order of Railway Conductors, held a dinner last week, to Mr. Weston, who is head of the order and who came down to visit the division in St. John and exemplify the work. The order embraces some 240 division leaders located all over the continent, with a membership of many thousands. In his speech Mr. Weston is reported to have said that while the society is organized for purposes of mutual support, help and insurance, it opposes strikes, and the fundamental law disallows them entirely as a means of seeking redress. Education, the education of employees and employed, gradual growth it may be, and peaceful arbitration are the means by which labor and capital can be brought into co-operative harmony.

Queen's Co. Case.
The Toronto Week takes a very candid and appears sensible view of the recent developments in the Queen's Co. election case. It says:—

It is certainly hard that Mr. King, after using every effort to get the case before the court, should have his petition dismissed and be obliged to pay the costs through the misadvice of his counsel. Still, it is hard that Mr. Baird, the sitting member, to be left with the odium that must follow from the openly expressed opinion of the Chief Justice and one of his learned judges, who represent the law of the land, that he has evaded the law and pre-arranged the miscarriage of justice. While the petitioner suffers only the pecuniary loss and the smart of the disappointment, the latter, who has taken measures to purge himself by either a legal or a popular verdict, must henceforth sit in the midst of the stigma that attaches to a suspicion of successful fraud resting upon him. There are to be met with occasionally in business circles men who pride themselves in their cleverness when they have succeeded in evading legal penalty or penalty by some ruse of manœuvre. But in the Canadian commonsense, where every member is supposed to be entitled to a fair trial in the courts, the significant prefix of "honorable," it must be peculiarly galling to any one whose name is in the least sensitive, to find himself branded as a defrauder of the law.

The public expression of opinion of the authorities. The situation, too, is one which cannot simply be the matter of private dispute, but one which involves the body of parliamentary representatives and the general public.
