



A calculation based upon the hay pro-ductions of each County places the approximate yield of hay for the current year at 78.7 per cent. of an average or a shortage of about 80,000 tons. In quality, hay will probably be below average, due in part to the injurious effects of the ice, which lay on the fields last Winter, and in part to the peculiar character of the Summer and the extremely unfavorable season for haying. In some parts of the Province, Carleton County and Charlotte especially, the major part of the hay was got in the first two weeks of the season which were exceptionally fine; but in nearly every part of the Province there are farmers who have not yet finished having on their high intervales or uplands. The result must be the housing of much inferior hay. In view of this fact the exceptionally large amount of old hay held over in parts of the Province will prove of great advantage.
