OUR OTTAWA LETTER.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

OTTAWA, June 12.
Now that Sir Charles Tupper has announced his permanent retirement from Canadian political life in which he has played a prominent part for over thirty years, it will be appropriate to notice the fidelity with which he has served his chief. It is a fact never made public that Sir John Macdonald had only to ask his lieutenant to do anything and it will be done, and that Sir Charles himself has stated his willingness to play the part of unquestioning obedience to the Premier. I have this from the very best authority as Sir Charles has expressed it in words. The chief takes great pride in his loyalty from a man of Sir Charles's attainment.

LORD STANLEY IN OTTAWA.

Rideau Hall has received its new master; Lord Stanley of Preston, has been installed therein as Governor General of Canada, the highest position but one in the gift of the Crown. It is a notable fact that since the Union Sir John Macdonald has as Premier received all the Governor General we have had. The first of the rulers now stands as follows: Viscount Monck, from 1867 to Nov. 1868; Lord Lisgar, from 1868 to May 1872; Earl of Dufferin, from November 1872; Lord Lorne, from 1878 to 1883; Lord Lansdowne, from 1883 to May 1888; Lord Stanley of Preston, the present incumbent. The salary is \$10,000.
The complete staff at Government House is: Lieut. McMahon, Military Secretary; Hon. E. Stanley, Private Secretary; Capt. Colville, A. D. C.; Lieut. Eitney Bagot, extra A. D. C.
His Excellency's arrival and swearing in were not attended with any unusual demonstrations. Curiously enough the crowd, Lord Stanley's appearance is not at all like the wretched stooping portly cutes which are appearing in the papers. He is pleasant faced, learded and of a very mild manner and while not likely to set the heather ablaze will probably earn the good will of the people of this country whose guest he now is.

PERSONAL CHAT.

The annual meeting of the ministers of the Crown for the heated term has not commenced though there are indications of it. Lady Macdonald has been down in her special car to the Murray Bay preparing to take the Premier down in comfort. Being an Episcopalian, Lady Macdonald generally takes Sir John to her church. Last Sunday evening they drove up, with Sir Hugh and his pretty Toronto wife, to St. Alban's Church, but found the doors not yet opened. This shows how diligently the Premier attends service and provides a splendid example for all late comers to follow. Of the other ministers, Sir Hector and Mr. Foster have returned. Mr. Chaplin is in Washington seeing how they run their printing bureau so that this new branch of his department may be started in good order. Mr. Carling has gone to London.

FEDERAL ELECTIONS.

One of the two names mentioned in your correspondence last week, A. R. Dickie, has been chosen by the Conservatives of Cumberland to run for Sir Charles Tupper's vacant seat. No writ has yet been issued for Cardwell, Cumberland or Wicoulet.
Information sent to the Department by Inspector Dennis shows that the new Mormon settlement near Lethbridge, N. W. T., consists of about 20 families or some 100 souls. The first immigrants in June last from Utah, but have now doubled by additions. They can give no reason for deserting valuable farms in Utah and starting afresh in a new country, and the authorities that they are fugitives from the U. S. law punishing polygamy, and for that reason their immigration is not to be encouraged. O. J. Card is their head or crump man. They have houses and cattle and have made wonderful progress showing them to be industrious, intelligent people, who understand farming practice. So far so good, but these people will have to understand that they will have to put up with one wife to each man.

THE OPPOSITION LEADERSHIP.

Hon. E. Blake will arrive home in August, about six months before the meeting of Parliament, when it is generally believed he will consent to resume the position of leader. It is well known here that Mr. Laurier is as loyal to Mr. Blake as Sir Charles Tupper is to Sir John. He will be the most anxious to give way to Mr. Blake, and the Liberals will appeal to their old leader to again prepare a parliamentary platform for the general elections. Mr. Blake's skill as a parliamentarian is admittedly great, and there is no Conservative who knows better when to thrust in the heat of debate and amendments.

GENERAL NOTES.

Mr. Justice Taché has arrived and will to day enable the Supreme Court to sit and deliver judgments.
Mr. Campbell, who has been short hard secretary to Dufferin, Lorne and Lansdowne, will act in the same capacity to Stanley.
It is denied that Mr. Desjardins, Ex. M. P., has been appointed a Senator.
It seems pretty well settled that another Ontario man is to be taken into the Cabinet. Who will it be?
Leut. General Sir. Fred. Middleton will tomorrow lay the corner stone of an English Church at a mission near Ottawa.
Capt Evans of the 43rd of Ottawa has been appointed Lieutenant in the new "D" school of Infantry at London.

Land in Ireland.

The ruinous piece of land in Ireland, was illustrated last week at the auction mart in a most striking manner. The estate in the island of Achill, owned by the late Lord Cavin, was sold by order of his trustees, consisting of 2,008 acres of freehold land—in fact, the whole island—with house and estate, and the ruins of a castle. The auctioneer described the property as one of the finest sporting estates in Ireland, though he admitted that the tenants were three years in arrears with their rent. The property was sold practically without reserve, and after very slight competition was purchased by a lady at the modest figure of £230, or about six shillings an acre.—London Figaro.
Mrs. Ernestine Schaffner, of New York, spends the greater part of her time and money in behalf of prisoners who she believes are wrongly accused. She visits the police courts, and where she sees a man or woman who her judgment tells her is the victim of circumstantial evidence she furnishes bail, and at her own expense she secures the services of a lawyer. So far Mrs. Schaffner's intentions seem to be correct, and she has always won the case of her proteges, and has never lost a dollar by going their bail.
