

Dr. Atkinson and the Florenceville Bridge.

To the Editors of the Carleton Sentinel: I am informed on good authority that Mr Haines, the Local Government's Bridge Inepector, before leaving Florenceville, made reflections upon myself for giving no notice to the Government as to the condition of the Florenceville bridge. The statement is absolutely false. I have repeatedly called the attention of the Chief Commissioner, Mr. Ryan, both by personal interview and by letter, to the condition of the bridge. In the Fall of 1887, I wrote to Hon. Mr. Ryan, pointing out that the piers were undermining. I wrote to Mr. Brewer, of Upper Woodstock, getting his written opinion as to the Woodstock, getting his written opinion as to the proper course to pursue to provide a remedy, and enclosed his reply to the Chief Commissioner. To this letter I have the reply of the Chief Com. In the Spring of 1887, when the freshet threatened to take out the span connecting the bridge with the eastern bank of the river. I personally superintended (with the aid of several gentlemen of Florenceville, East and West) the placing of brush and stone next the shore, and preventing brush and stone next the shore, and preventing the bank from being washed away. During the sessions of the Legislature of 1887 and 1888, I had a number of interviews with Hon. Mr. Ryan ss to the condition of the bridge, and as to how the undermining could be prevented. In May, 1888, I wrote the Hon. Mr. Ryan telling him of the condition of the piers and pointing out that the stone in one of the compartments had all disappeared and suggested that something ought to be done immediately. I have a copy of that letter in my possession and also that Hon.

gentleman's reply and his reply will gentleman's reply, and his reply will prove that I was the first to give notice of the condition of the Florenceville Bridge—and notwithstanding all this I am charged with neglect by a minion of the Government in connec-

glect by a minion of the Government in connection with this bridge. There has been neglect of the poorest kind in connection with this bridge but it has been neglect by the Government, not neglect by me. They have had repeated and ample warning to which they have paid but tardy heed, and now they seek to place the blame on some one else. Whether it is the duty of the bridge inspector to go through this county as an electioneering agent of the Government, may be fairly questioned. Possibly it might be as well for him to mind his own business. No doubt he feels grateful to the Government for the pap with which they feed him, and desires to show his gratitude, but after all to become the mere vehicle of slander and falsehood is no very exalted calling. I would remind him and his masters that his presence here in this county his masters that his presence here in this county with a crowd of help from the County of York, constructing our public bridges in this county, is after all no very great compliment to our bridge builders nor our workmen living in the county, and who are neither few nor incapable.
