WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, May 31st, 1889.

Nowhere in this land of ours is Decoration day so generally observed as in Washington. Nowhere is the true character of the day so retained. The large proportion of Union veterans among the residents of this city dominate the city upon this sacred day. There are fewer shooting matches, base-ball games, and common drinks in Washington on Decoration day than in New York. Of course the local League base ball team took advantage of yesterday to play two games, but the attendance was of the roughest element.

The day opened cool and beautiful, fair as a dream of Arcadia. The city streets were decorated in the afternoon. Green wreaths took place at Arlington, the Soldiers Home, the Congressional Cemetery, and in most cemeteries where soldiers are buried. There were also trips to Mt. Vernon, and to the military cemeteries near Alexandria and Fredericksburg.

The nomination of Gen. Lew Wallace and Henry Tucker as commissioners to Italy, which was made last Monday evening and hastily withdrawn as premature occasioned much gossip, not to say a wild furor of criticism. Mr. Tucker says that he was offered the place by Secretary Blaine a week before and only accepted as a personal favor to the President. Mr. Tucker attributes the withdrawal of the appointments to the efforts of General Boynton and thinks General Boynton's desire to thwart Mr. Blaine has more to do with the case than anything else. All the talk of his connection with the assassination of Lincoln and the Canadian plots of the confederates Mr. Tucker denounces as absurd. Gen. Wallace denies that he objected to Mr. Tucker as a colleague. Thus the reasons of the President for his action are unascertained.

The appointment of Orion W. Chapman, of New York, to the important and lucrative position of Solicitor General is a great disappointment to the Southern Republican members of Congress, who had nearly all recommended Ex-Army General Blair of Virginia, for the position, which they regarded by precedent as belonging to the South. A number of them are outspoken in their chagrin. One said at Willard's last night "that Mr. Harrison had so far vouchsafed no recognition to Southern Republicans, as they had not been favored with one important appointment." "If the President ignored that he continued 'that wing of the party that take advantage on the floor of the House by remaining neutral.'"

Why They Go.

A Montreal paper thus discusses an interesting problem.

The public works of the Maritime Provinces have put in circulation vast sums which should have proved a great stimulus to the industries and the commerce of that portion of Canada at least, to say nothing of the facilities afforded by the railway expenditures for opening up and developing the interior of those provinces. Why the maritime people should have secured a country "that Mr. Harrison had so far vouchsafed no recognition to Southern Republicans, as they had not been favored with one important appointment." What are the facts?

Between 1871 and 1881, Nova Scotia's increase of population was over thirteen per cent. New Brunswick gained one twelve per cent., Prince and Edward Island fifteen per cent., while Maine gained only about three per cent., during the decade between 1870 and 1880. An examination of the census returns for all the New England states shows that except in the very large cities the population was almost stationary. In many rural districts of the most prosperous New England states the population is actually decreasing. Where do the people go? Some go west to take up cheap farming lands; others crowd into the big cities. The same influences which draw Americans from the rural districts and small towns to the big cities and the great West attract Canadians. It is probable that the international boundary line rather tends to show the tide of migration than otherwise. Probably the majority of the migrants would do a great deal better at home.
