

Why They Go. A Montreal paper thus discusses an inter-

eting problem:-The public works of the Maritime Provinces have put in circulation vast sums which should have proved a great stimulus to the industries and the commerce of that portion of Canada at least, to say nothing of the facilities afforded by the railway expenditures for opening up and developing the interior of those provinces. Why the maritime people should leave such a country passes all understanding. Here the public treasury is on tap. Here the gentlest pressure causes millions to flow. Here the elector has only to make his demand and the public has only to make his demand and the public money bags are banded over. It is not in Yankeeland nor yet in the American North-West that millions are scattered through constituencies at such short notice and under such slight pretexts. Then why this exodus? What is the explanation of this abandonment of a country, which, in addition to good soil, a fine climate, rich mines, vast fisheries, and an extensive commerce, is actually over-laid with the public's money for public

Many people attribute this exedus to the lack of free trade intercourse with the United States. They say with annexation, commercial union or unrestricted reciprocity, the exodus would cease. Is this the case? Let us see whether the adjoining states of the Republic are in a better position as regards growth of population. If Maine, which adjoins these provinces is increasing. joins these provinces, is increasing much more rapidly than Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, it will be reasonable to suppose that free trade with the States would put a

What are the facts? Between 1871 and 1881, Neva Scotia's increase of population was over thirteen per cent., New Brunswick gained one twelve per cent., Prince and Edward Island fifteen per cent., while Maine gained only about three per cent., during the decode between 1870 and 1880. An examination decade between 1870 and 1880. An examination of the census returns for all the New England states shows that except in the very large cities the population was almost stationary. In many rural districts of the most Cuffs, Gloves & Ho prosperous New England states the popula-tion is actually decreasing. Where do the people go? Some go west to take up cheap farming lands; others crowd into the big cities. The same influences which draw Americans from the rural districts and small

towns to the big cities and the great West attract Canadiane. It is probable that the international boundary line rather tends to stem the tide of migration than otherwise. Probably the majority of the migrants would do a great deal better at home.




