World's S. S. Convention.

From English papers kindly forwarded us by Messrs. Boyer and Parsons, we are led to infer that the late World's Convention of Sabbath workers at London, was a grand success. There were present over five hundred foreign delegates, a large portion of whom came from the United States. This Dominion was creditably represented, including of course the delegates from New Brunswick. From the reports submitted we learn that in Great Britain the number of Sunday School scholars in 1818 was 477,000; in 1833 it was 1,548,000, and in 1889, 5,733,000, or one in five of the population. In Canada the number is put down at 476,000, and in the States at 15 per cent. of the population, or between nine and ten millions.

The Sunday School Chronicle, published at London, which gave full reports of the various sessions of the Convention, has the following kindly worded criticism:—

Never before has such a rich treat been offered to Sunday School workers in England. Though some sessions were more interesting than others, there was not one but had its memorable incidents. Our friends from across the Atlantic, who are so much more acquainted with these great Conventions than we are, have expressed themselves as delighted and satisfied, and we are sure that this opinion finds a ready response in the hearts of the English workers who were present. Those, however, on whom the labor and anxiety chiefly fell, who have been busy for months in preparation, as well as most assistants in carrying out the arrangements, have the greatest reason to rejoice, and their reward will come in the knowledge of the wide-spread influence which this Convention cannot fail to have. We cannot, however, withhold our disappointment at the absence from the meetings of our London ministers. Our would have thought that they would have gladly embraced the opportunity of hearing, at least, some of the eminent workers from the United States, where the Sunday School occupies so much more important and exalted a position than it does with us, and we are quite sure that they would have received suggestions in the line of their own work which would have tended greatly to increase their usefulness. We feel so highly the value of hearty cooperation between ministers and Sunday School teachers, that we are glad of any opportunity that may tend to bring them more closely together; but the absence of our pastors, who are the presidents of our Sunday Schools, from the meetings of our Convention filled us with regret and disappointment.

Then, too, we were surprised to find so few of our school officers and teachers availing themselves of the opportunity of attending the meetings of the Convention. At the morning and afternoon sessions it might not be expected that they should be present, but we quite anticipated at the evening sessions the galleries would be crowded. When they come to read, as we trust they will, the reports presented to them, we trust they will feel that they have lost rare occasions of having their hearts and minds stimulated and informed. If the Convention does no more than show us what grand conceptions many of the delegates have of the possibilities of the Sunday School, and how earnestly and devotedly they are desiring to realize them, we shall have learnt a life-abiding lesson.
