**Communicated.**  
**The Bridge.**  
During the sitting of the Local Parliament during the present year, if I remember correctly, in one of your issues, the attention of all concerned was drawn particularly to the unsafe condition of the bridge crossing the St. John at Woodstock, and also to the disgraceful and dangerous approach to the same. Since that time nothing appears to have been done to improve the condition for the safety of travellers.

Having occasion to pass and repass this way at least once a week for some years, and taking all precaution as I thought for my own as well as for the safety of my horse, yet I have not escaped from accident, and, on one occasion, nearly lost my life. Some decided steps to better this thoroughfare should be taken: the planking of the bridge in some places is not safe at present to pass over, and should an action for damages be brought, I think the cost would come to more than timely preventives. A fence of some kind placed on the river side of the road from near the Water Works to the bridge would prevent horses and people from falling down the steep bank.

**FREDERICK TOPICS.**

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FREDERICKTOPICS, July 31st.  
The Frederick Association base ball team has now six professional players.

About 30 of our friends have signified their intention to participate in the Halifax carnival festival.

The Royal School of Infantry are camping at Col. Mansel's farm, "Fern Hill," a few miles above the city, where they will remain about three weeks.

Mr. Humphrey of the "Union Line" made a display of fireworks, including the release of two hot air balloons from the deck of the steamer David Weston, on Saturday evening, in honor of the immense number of passengers returning from the carnival on that day.

City Treasurer Moore received ten thousand dollars in taxes on Monday last, that day terminating the period limited for allowing the discount.

A man named John Myhrall has been pronounced to be insane, consequently he was removed to the lunatic asylum on Tuesday last.

Whooping cough of a malignant type is quite prevalent in the city, and has resulted fatally in the case of quite a number of small children.

Mr. Wm. Sewell, lumberman, was thrown from his carriage near Springfield, Monday afternoon, but miraculously escaped serious injury.

Frederick has in all probability more base ball clubs than any city of its size in existence. Children of 8 and 9 years of age can be observed on the street almost any day strolling in base ball costume eagerly enquiring the result of the last game.

The Association base ball nine was a magnificent game from the Shamrocks of St. John as evinced by the score of 8 to 3, but on the occasion of the successive game with the Nationals, our boys were miserably "wiped out" by the degrading score of 25 to 4, the latter of course maintained by the Fredericton team. As this was the first game in the "Spaulding Pennant Contest," it was rather a discouraging termination.

Our boys attribute the disastrous result to the fact that they were unaccustomed to playing on such miserable ground, the inferior arrangement of which was clearly apparent.

Fredericton's two victories over the Monarchs at St. John on Friday last have reinvigorated the enthusiasm of our team, and they have undoubtedly more than redeemed their previous failure, while their reputation will be still further enhanced if they succeed in winning one of the games from St. John to be played here on Friday and Saturday next.

Last week the city was comparatively deserted, as every person who could conveniently or possibly absent himself from his work, rushed frantically to the extensively advertised "St. John Carnival," the chief feature of which was undoubtedly the grand "Electrical Exhibition."

It is estimated that Fredericton was represented in the marvellous number of 3,000 persons; thus it cannot be insinuated that the "Celestials" bear malice toward their rival city, notwithstanding the fact that they possess indubitable cause, considering that St. John strenuously endeavored to "get all the tobacco to grind."
