TOWN COUNCIL.

The Council met on the 29th inst.

A petition was read by Con. Murphy asking that the sidewalk on Connel street be extended. Received and referred to road committee.

The Mayor reported that the Judge had received judgment on the Howard review case, when his Worship was tendered a vote of thanks for going to Andover and attending the review in the interest of the town.

A petition from J. A. Jordan and others was presented asking a right of way across the Poor Farm, whereupon it was resolved that a highway be laid out across the Poor Farm, two rods wide and following as near as practicable the southwest bank of Marvin's brook.

John Campbell, through Con. Henderson, asked that he be either paid for acting as a substitute for the Night Watch, or relieved from duty.

Jas. Munro and John C. Arnold were appointed constables and members of the police.

It was decided that he had been unwell for the past two weeks, and when he went home on the 20th, and previous to that with the supposition that he was unwell, he was appointed to relieve him from duty for a time. In reference to the complaints of the disorder said to have prevailed on the past two Sundays, he had made enquiries, but could not learn the names of those who caused the disorder, and consequently could not bring the guilty ones to justice. He had entered upon the duties of Marshal determined faithfully to discharge the same, or if he found this impossible, to resign, he had then, and would so, to the Mayor, and would be glad to be preserved order. Having found the pay inadequate to the amount of work performed and exposure endured, he had asked for higher salary; the request had been granted, but while his salary was increased, so also was the work assigned him.

The Poor House committee was authorized to have the Poor House repaired and the necessary improvements added.

April 2.
