

To the Editors of the Carleton Sentinel,
Woodstock School Library.
As the result of a subscription paper circu-
lated in January last, I have to announce that
the sum of \$112 was collected for the purpose
of a Public School Library for the town. The
original subscription list has been deposited
with the Secretary of Trustees. The first
order of books was obtained about two months
ago, consisting of 163 vols. at a cost of
\$89.10. My thanks are due to W. H. Er-
nest, Esq., and I take this opportunity to
publicly acknowledge his kindness for obtain-
ing these books at a cost much below what I
could have obtained them for. Included in the
three amount, books of the value of \$16
have been procured from private gentlemen
in town. Another order has been sent for some
35 vols., and these are daily expected. In
addition to the above I have received from
F. H. Hale, M. P., a number of books, pam-
phlets and parliamentary papers which I am
sure will prove of much advantage and profit
to the pupils.

When all the books have been placed on
the shelves, it will be found to comprise
about 220 vols. of standard works of history,
biography, science and fiction. This is a
very satisfactory beginning which I trust will
be encouraged by zealous additions so that in
a short time a library of no mean proportions
may be established as an adjunct of the S. S.
School and for the use of all. I take this op-
portunity to state that donations of books
from any of our citizens will be gladly received
by the committee in charge and appropri-
ately acknowledged. The library is open
for the distribution of books every Friday
afternoon from 3.30 to 4 o'clock during the
session of the school term.

Bristol Items.
On the afternoon of Friday the 10th, 1889,
a large number of the private friends and political
supporters of Dr. Atkinson assembled at the rail-
way station on the arrival of the afternoon train
from Fredericton, to receive and pay their re-
spects to that gentleman on his return home.
After the usual congratulations had passed the
Doctor and his friends adjourned to the public
hall where a large audience of ladies and gen-
tlemen had already convened. The meeting was
immediately called to order by Mr. Home, Glas-
ville; Mr. Sherwood was elected chairman, and
the following address read and presented to the
Doctor by Mr. McCallister.

ADDRESS.
Dr. Atkinson, M. P., County of Carleton:
Sir,—We, the undersigned, representatives of
both Conservative and Liberal constituents, in
this section of Carleton County, take the present
opportunity, on your return home from your
parliamentary labors, of conveying to you, in the
name of the constituency you have hitherto so
ably represented in our Provincial Parliament,
the warmest expression of their unqualified ap-
probation of the political course you pursued
during the last session of our Provincial Legisla-
ture.

The Carleton stand which you made on the
great questions of Finance, which came up for
parliamentary discussion—your eloquent and
powerful advocacy of retrenchment in different
departments, where the pecuniary resources of
the Province are being recklessly and shamefully
squandered—your able and judicious manage-
ment of the political course which you repre-
sented in our Provincial Parliament, have all
been the subject of our most anxious and
earnest consideration. Your clear, consistent and
eloquent addresses, on all subjects of debate,
which occupied the attention of our Local House
during the past session, and the able manner in
which on every occasion, you fought the battles
of the People—the true source of all legitimate
power—voiced in unmistakable language the
opinion of the Constituents which you repre-
sented. We desire most emphatically to say that
your Political Career hitherto has intensified the
same confidence in you, as our Political Repre-
sentative, which we have all along reposed in
you as our Medical Adviser, and the same con-
fidence and regard which we have always enter-
tained for you as a private Christian Gentleman.
We have the honor to be,
Sir, your obedient servants,
Denis McCallister, James Sherwood,
James McCall, Hugh Miller,
Michael Walsh, John Bond,
William Love, John Home,
William Thistle, and 186 others.

The Doctor who received with cheers
and applause the Ladies and Gentlemen,
I scarcely know how to reply to this
warm expression of your regard, esteem and
confidence. I came to this country 7 years ago
—a stranger—and followed my profession. I
was elected your parliamentary representative,
and the platform of government support, but
when I saw that the Blair government were
betraying the country by passing measures, which
would in consequence could not approve, I felt it
necessary to withdraw my countenance, and assert
my independence. I could not and would not
support measures which were hastening the
ruin of New Brunswick. You know my plat-
form—the abolition of the Legislative Council,
Reform, Retrenchment. When I reminded the
leader of the government of his pledge to abolish
the Legislative Council, his answer was evasive,
and I saw he was humbugging us. I proposed
indemnity to induce Council to vote themselves
out as the act must have their consent. He
promised, but his promises were not fair and
square; his bill was so hampered with conditions
that it was thrown out. He has falsified every
promise—gone back on every promise—violated
every pledge. Public works should be open to
public tenders, and not given to political par-
ties, without tenders. There should be, if pos-
sible, no increase of public debt. Well, then,
just contrast the finances of present government
with those of the old—over-expenditure of
\$24,000 per year, etc. The expenses of the
country are increasing to an alarming ex-
tent. Public Printing is almost one-third more
than when it was used by—Cash Hire, one-half
more—Stationery one-half more. The travelling
expenses paid to members of the government and
other public officers amounted to \$8,152 for
1887—that is at 10 cts. per mile 6,192 miles of
travel. How is that for high? And so on and
on in infinitum. In every department there has been
no reduction, but shameful increases. The govern-
ment which controls the House is deluding
the people. You are a shameless humbugger.
It is not necessary to dwell on that subject now.
But when I felt it my duty to withdraw my sup-
port the Attorney General displayed his inces-
sant in his mean attempts to injure me in
character and position. But I think I hear some
one saying, if you quarrel with the government,
you will get nothing. Why on that principle,
no matter how corrupt a government might be,
it should never be contended—no matter how
iniquitous a measure might be, the representa-
tives of the people should vote for it, or they
would get nothing. Sir, I will never degrade
myself by the adoption of such a policy. Hitherto
I trust I have kept my hands clean and my con-
science untroubled, and your action this day has
proved that I am still honored with your con-
fidence.

The Doctor's address, of which the above is
but a very imperfect outline, was listened to
with much pleasure and frequently and loudly
applauded.

Cries for Mr. Home brought that gentleman
to the platform. He reviewed in highly com-
plimentary terms the Doctor's political career,
ending up with such an impassioned criticism

of the Female Suffrage question, as kept the au-
dience in a continual roar of laughter.
A vote of thanks was cordially awarded to the
chairman—God Save the Queen was sung—and
the meeting separated.

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
