Elections in the United States.
BOSTON, Nov. 6.—The following is a summary of yesterday's elections as far as known this morning:
Massachusetts, Republican by 7,000 majority over 20,000.
Maine, Republican, defeated in Virginia by over 20,000.
Pennsylvania is Republican.
Opposition to Democratic ticket in Mississippi.
In Maryland the Democrats gain the biggest victory they ever obtained in that State. Both sides claim Iowa by a small majority. New Jersey is Democratic by a large majority.
Ohio is doubtful.
It is rumored that the entire Republican ticket is defeated in Colorado.
The Democratic majority in New York is about 27,000. The Legislature is Republican.
In Massachusetts, with city of Quincy and 13 towns missing, the totals for Governor are: Brackett, Republican, 123,691; Russell, Democrat, 117,225; Blackman, Prohibitionist, 13,263. The political make-up of the Legislature, according to these returns, is: Senate—30 Republicans, 10 Democrats, against 22 Republicans and 8 Democrats this year. House—157 Republicans, 70 Democrats, 13 to be heard from, against 180 Republicans and 60 Democrats this year.
CHICAGO, N. V. 6.—A special from Columbus, O., says: "Allen G. Thurman has sent the following telegram to Grover Cleveland, 'Gov. Foraker has surrendered all the Republican flags in Ohio.'"
BALTIMORE, Nov. 6.—The latest returns from throughout the State indicate the Democrats have a majority in the Legislature, but not so large as last year. In this city the Democrats have a majority in the city government.
CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—A special from Iowa to a Democratic paper says the Republican State Committee concedes the election of Boies, Democrat, for Governor, with five to eight thousand plurality. The entire State Democratic ticket was elected.
BALTIMORE, Nov. 6.—The Democrats will have a majority of the State, Senate and House delegates.

SANTA FE, Nov. 5.—One of the severest snow and wind storms in the history of New Mexico prevailed for the past three days. The reports are coming in of great damage to live stock on the northern range. A number of cowboys and sheep herds, it is feared, have perished. At Las Vegas eighteen inches of snow covered the ground, and at Socorro and Albuquerque there are eight inches, a most unusual occurrence for that locality.
