

Destructive Storms. CHICAGO, May 11 .- After seven days of the hottest weather ever known in Chicago at this time of year, a furious storm swept over the baked city and broke the drought. The storm while at its beight raged with the fury of a tornado. It came off the prairies with a tremendous roar and sent trees, chimneys and signs flying in every direction. In Garfield Park over one hundred trees were uprooted. Dazzling lightning and terrific claps of thunder created consternation in the claps of thunder created consternation in the streets. Cabe and carriages were demolished in runaways and the police had their hands full stopping horses, which were plunging in every direction. Many buildings were set on fire by the lightning, which seemed to fill the streets. The electrical display was dazzling. FREDERICK, Md., May 11.—A tornado occurred yesterday in the Potomac valley, near Point of Rocks, 70 miles above Washington.

Milk Inspection.

The Globe says:-Mr. J. C. Ferguson, preventive officer and food inspector in the Inland Revenue Department, returned to Sc. John on Saturday. In March last Mr. Ferguson was authorized to collect samples of milk through New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Cape Breton. He has now finished his work and submitted his Call at once and examine the Goods. report to the department at Ottswa. The samples were taken promiscuously, so that justice would be done to the producer, vendor and purchaser. In some cases the milk was rocured from the milk care, and afterwards samples of the same milk were bought at the stores, and also at the farm. Three samples were taken in every case. Mr. Ferguson found several cases where the milk procured at stores during the afternoon was adulterated nearly one half. The specific gravity of the government standard is placed between 1.029 and 1.033, with 3 75 butter fat. He keeps proper memoranda of all samples, with names of producers, vendors, etc , so that at any time he can furnish the fullest information possible. Since March Mr. Ferguson has collected 148 samples of milk. 
