**Destructive Storms.**  
CHICAGO, May 11.—After seven days of the hottest weather ever known in Chicago at this time of year, a furious storm swept over the city and broke the drought. The storm while it is being waged with the fury of a tornado. It came off the prairies with a tremendous roar and sent trees, chimneys and signs flying in every direction. In Garfield Park over one hundred trees were uprooted. Dazzling lightning and terrific claps of thunder created consternation in the streets. Cabs and carriages were demolished in runaway and the police had their hands full stopping horses, which were plunging in every direction. Many buildings were set on fire by the lightning, which seemed to fill the streets. The electrical display was dazzling. Reports from the country are to the effect that great damage was done to buildings.

**At Galesburg, Ill., Saturday,** several houses were struck by lightning, telephone and telegraph wires were down, and windmills and chimneys without number blown down. Old residents say it was the worst storm in thirty years. Mrs. Wm. McNall and four children, at Ridgeway, Friday, caught safely in a cellar. Lightning struck the house and the mother and three children were killed.

A terrific storm passed over a portion of Virginia on Sunday. Lightning destroyed several barns and stables and much stock was killed. Part of the storm was visited by a severe hail storm, which utterly destroyed the wheat crop. Fences and houses were blown down, but no human lives lost.
