

NOTES BY THE WAY. MESSES. EDITORS,—On my return home I left Montreal on Tuesday, the 20th inst. It was 3 40 p. m. when we rolled out of Windsor station, which is the Short Line station,

and I think the finest I have seen in my travels. It is a large stone building, five or six stories high and very large on the ground. All the offices except the ticket office are on the upper flats to which you can go up without any great exertion—all you have to do is System

Out any great exertion—all you have to do is to step on the elevator and you are carried up at once. We run up the river 8 miles to Lachine where we cross on a fine trestle bridge. Here the water is short

bridge. Here the water is shoal, with a hard rocky bottom, just right to rest heavy piers on. After crossing the bridge we bear away further South than the Grand Trunk, which crosses at Montreal. That road, as it can be seen by the map, runs nearly the same course as the St. Lawrence down as far as the Rich. mond junction, where it branches off into two lines, the one running East to Quebec and the other running South through the States of Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine to Portland. From the bridge to Farnham, about 35 miles, the country is almost as level as a prairie and one of the finest farming sec tions in Quebec. On the way we cross the Richelieu at St. Johns, which is nearly as wide, I should judge, as the River St. John at Woodstock, and runs North into the St. Lawrence. St. Johns is a smart, thriving town with a number of factories and the Short Line already has been a great benefit to it. After leaving Farnham, the country grows harder, hilly and rocky, and we soon find ourselves ascending a pretty steep grade to get over what is called, I think, the Orville mountains to the South; there is a peak called Broom mountain, and, to the North, Foster mountain. 
