for the purpose of purchasing land, erecting

buildings, etc., for a County Exhibition.

The following societies were represented

at the meeting, viz., Jacksonville Society, by

John Harper and J. W. Simonson; Carleton

Society, by Robert Brown, Andrew

Stevenson, C. P. Bull, Peoples Union, Hart-

land, S. E. Campbell, Glasville and Cen-

treville Societies were not represented at the

meeting.

John Harper was elected chairman and

Andrew Stevenson secretary pro tem. The

chairman, in a few well chosen remarks, ex-

plained the object of the meeting. Short

addresses were given by the delegates and

others present, all warmly in favor of

the proposed union. G. R. Kitchum, M. P.

was present and would do all he could to

help the scheme. Glasville and Centreville

being represented it was deemed advisable

to hold another meeting at an early day to

give them an opportunity to be present.

Moved by Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr.

Simonson, "That this meeting adjourn to

meet at Hartland on the first Tuesday in

January at 2 o'clock p. m., to further con-

sider this matter." Carried.
