What Burke told Heffer.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 20.—The Free Press says this evening that Heffer, the discharged prisoner who was in jail with Burke, who is charged with complicity in the Cronin murder, stated that Burke told him that Cronin was murdered in the Carleton cottage on the night of May 4th, and that he was present at the commission of the deed, together with a number of others, whose names he gave after the murder and threw the bodies into the lake. Burke also told him that he and the others took the bodies to the lake shore in an express wagon. They threw the bodies into the lake, but it would not sink and drifted ashore, so they put it back into the wagon, took it back to the city and hid it for the night. On the following night they set forth again, intending to sink the box containing the remains into the lake by means of weights, but, becoming suddenly panic-stricken with fear of capture, they dropped the body into the manhole and threw the box into the canal lot where it was found on the following day. Burke mentioned the names of those ordering the commission of the crime and those taking part in it, and he also told him that he paid him the money to leave Chicago and go to Europe by Winnipeg. These names Heffer gave to his law agent, and he said that he is most circumstantial. This fact it is that leads to a strong belief in its truthfulness, as evidenced by the fact that the names of the persons named by Burke are the same as those named by the State authorities at Chicago of the statements by Gilette, Mills and Heffer, but have not yet heard anything in reply.

Canadian Pacific.

T. G. Shugbess, assistant president of the Canadian Pacific, arrived home on the 28th inst. from England. He has contracted for the first time in the Pacific service, the second in fifteen and the third in sixteen months from date. The vessel is 440 feet long, 51 feet beam, 35 feet hold, with two screw engines, 18 knots an hour, 6,000 gross tons, and cost a million dollars each. They will have gun platforms so as to be readily turned into armed cruisers if the admiralty require it.

The Canadian Pacific railway people were jubilant today when the return for the month of September were handed in. The net earnings for the road during the last month were \$370,000 in excess of the corresponding month last year, or an increase of 105 per cent.

Progress of Inventions Since 1845.
