A nine-year-old lad at Jabbalpur, India, is under arrest for having buried alive his younger brother, aged thirteen months. He admitted the offence and stated he and his brother were orphans. He had to beg for a living, and as he could not take the younger about with him, he thought much trouble would be saved by burying him.

A novel case is before the Paris Society of Public Medicine. A suburban practitioner, called in to attend a patient suffering from scurvy fever, advised the landlord to disinfect the house. This was done, and the landlord was the patient to recover the cost. The patient thereupon sued the doctor for breach of professional secrecy, and it is thought that he will win the case.

Word comes from India that wolves are causing great devastation in the central provinces. One pack killed and devoured 40 persons, who were engaged in washing cattle. The victims were mostly children. The wolves ate them, but did not touch the cattle.
