Great Exhibition of 1890. This year's animal was bred by M. Desrochers in Carleton County. He was raised in 1888, stands 17 hands high, and weighs 1325 lbs. He is a pure Friesian, sired by Count D'Albany, his dam La Bru. His color is dark iron grey, with light mane and tail, white hind feet and white star in face.

He will stand at Jacksonville Mondays: Tuesdays he will go to Woodstock; Wednesdays to Carleton Place; Thursdays to Carleton Place; Fridays to Carleton Place; Saturdays to Carleton Place; Sundays to Carleton Place.

Terms:—Single service, \$4; by the season, \$8; to insure, \$2. Either by the season or to insure, \$2 must be paid at first service. Three horses owned by one person will be sold at the price of two. Members of either Society will be allowed a discount of \$1 when contract is by the season. All mares will be at owners risk in foal. All mares disposed of will be considered in foal.
