Mr. Wm Ryder of Cold Stream East, is putt-ing in camp supplies on the North Branch of Miramichi, where he intends lumbering this pose that two farmers, A and B, are living on opposite sides of the line. A lives on the N. B, side and B. on the American side and J. W. Biggar became frightened and broke we allow that each keeps a large flock of hens and consequently has a quantity of eggs to sell. Now B. living on the U.S. aide sells his eggs in the American market for sixteen cents per dozen. Now the American laborer pays no duty on them, because there is none to pay. Now A goes across the line. is none to pay. Now A goes across the line and pays a duty of five cents per dozen simply for the privilege of the American market, then he sells his eggs the same as B for sixteen cents per dozen. Now, I ask, does not that duty come out of the price of A's eggs, and does the American laborer pay any more for his eggs than he does for B's eggs? Thus while B's eggs net him sixteen cents per dozen, A's only net him eleven cents, all on account of the tariff wall built up between us and the United States. And as with eggs, so it is with everything else.


