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A notable feature of the proceedings at the Municipal Council, on Tuesday, was the passage, by unanimous vote, of an excellently worded memorial resolution in memory of Sir John A. Macdonald.

Within three days Sir William Gordon Cumming was pronounced by a verdict of the jury guilty of cheating at cards, was married to a rich young American lady, who refused to give up the existing engagement.

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
