CARLETON COUNTY COUNCIL.
June 16th, 1891.

Council met in semi-annual session; War-
den Smith in chair; Counsellors all present.
Minutes of last meeting read and approved.
On motion of Mr. Caldwell, seconded by
Mr. Foster, the Council went into committee
to consider the accounts of the County, Mr.
Harding in the chair.

After considering the accounts, committee
rose, reported action, and the following ac-
count was ordered to be paid—
G. F. Foster, \$45.70; Jas. McDougall, \$2;
Robt. Home, \$5.75; Wm. Harris, \$1.90;
Carleton Sentinel, \$55.50; Woodstock Press,
\$1.50; J. O. Gibson, \$15; J. S. Leighton,
\$38.25; Sam. Jones, \$12; Sam. Jones,
\$85; S. B. Appleby, \$102.00; R. K. Jones,
\$100; the Court, \$25.00; P. A. Brown,
\$12.85; H. D. McManus, \$11.20;
Sheriff Dibblee, \$107.50; Pat. McAnns,
\$9; G. N. Good, \$40; H. Gidding, \$7.

On motion of Mr. Caldwell, seconded by
Mr. Foster, account C. M. Lloyd, \$5, ordered

On motion of Mr. Caldwell, seconded by

On motion of Mr. Melville, seconded by

On motion of Mr. Foster, seconded by Mr.
Moore, Charles Oldwell is added to list of
constables, Simonsville.

On motion of Mr. McIntosh, seconded by
Mr. Humphill, Judson Milberry and Joseph
Nixon are added to list of constables, Aber-
deen.

On motion of Mr. Caldwell, seconded by
Mr. Corbett—Resolved, That the resolution
passed at the January session of this Council
in reference to taxing debtors in jail be
reconsidered.

On motion of Mr. Moore, seconded by
Mr. Foster, a by-law is ordered providing
that no cattle of any kind shall go or be al-
lowed to run at large on any highway or
common on the shore of the River St. John
in the Parish of Simonsville, in the Municipality
of Carleton, between the first day of May
and the first day of November, in each and
every year.

On motion of Mr. Humphill, seconded by
Mr. Watson, (Richmond), the following are
added to list of Parish Officers, Richmond:
Richard Crabbe, Surveyor of Highways, and
Robert McBry, constable.

On motion of Mr. Corbett, seconded by
Mr. Colter, ordered that \$1 be paid to B.
McIntosh, and assessed on Northampton, be-
ing costs incurred in consequence of not be-
ing notified by collector.

On motion of Mr. Corbett, seconded by
Mr. Gibson, the following are added to the
list of Parish Officers, Kent: Albert Haw-
thorne to be commissioner in place of Geo.
W. Westman; Constable—John Rodgers,
Henry M. Bell, Herbert Boyer, Manzer
Bloodworth, Stephen Gibson; Surveyors of
Roads—Cornelius Sullivan, Moses Brennan;
Hog Reeves and Pound Keepers—Wm. Gal-
lagher, (in place of L. Gallagher), Thos.
Foley.

On motion of Mr. Harding, seconded by
Mr. Lindsay, the following are added to list
of Parish Officers, Wakefield: Cook Estey,
Geo. McLeod, Pound Keepers, Hog Reeves
and Field Drivers: Brock Vail, in place of
Charles Wheeler, refused to serve. Alanzo
Dawson in place of M. Sherwood, left Parish.
Surveyors of Roads: Jas. Simonsville, Parish
Clock, in place of G. W. Holmes, left Parish.

On motion of Mr. Williams, seconded by
Mr. Strong—Resolved, That the appointment
of H. B. White be confirmed as assessor of
rates, in place of B. W. Balloch, resigned.
Also that Olin King be appointed collector
of rates in place of S. S. Wiggins, unable to
perform the duties of the office on account
of poor health, and that A. B. D. Forest be
appointed pound keeper in place of H. P.
Carvell, refusing to act; also James Flem-
ing, pound keeper, in place of Robert Flem-
ing, on account of sickness. All in Parish
of Wilmet.

On motion of Mr. Melville, seconded by
Mr. Caldwell—Resolved, That S. T. Ross
prepare a bill to go before Legislature to au-
thorize the collector to provide bond to de-
tors in jail, and have amounts charged to the
Parishes where their settlements are.

On motion of Mr. Colter, seconded by Mr.
Rogers, James Humphill is appointed a col-
lector, Northampton, and Nathan Rogers
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ceded everywhere, not only in Canada but
in the United States and England, that Sir
John died, a great man, one who stood
high in public esteem everywhere, had fall-
en. He was great in what he had accom-
plished for Canada, which he had been
the father of Confederation, and over whose
extent he had extended a railway connecting
the two great oceans. A man like Sir
John in all respects, and it is to be feared
the world over. He was a man of clear
mind, of grand ideas for his country, and of
highly practical sense, and he was under-
stood by all. He was a man who would
do anything, just how it would come out.
In esteem and regard for him men of all
parties were united. He would not attempt
much longer to remain here, he would move,
seconded by Mr. Drysdale—

Resolved, That the members of the Municipal
Council of Carleton County, Northampton
session assembled, having heard with feelings of
deep regret that it has pleased an all-wise Pro-
vidence to remove by death a new person, and
aid, the Premier of the Dominion, are desirous
of placing upon record their feelings of sorrow at
the removal from the Council of one of the
members of one of our great cities, who has for upwards
of thirty years been identified with the history and
progress of Canada, whose services as one of the
most prominent of the builders of the Dominion
will stimulate the youth of our country to an
emulation that may be for the benefit of a dis-
tinguished prominence in the future of Canada; also
they desire to extend their hearty sympathy to
Lady Macdonald in her time of affliction.

Resolved, That a copy of the above be forwarded
to Lady Macdonald by the Mayor and Secre-
tary of the County.

Mr. Drysdale said he rose to second the
resolution. It was but just to himself to ex-
plain that it was only a few moments before
that he had been asked to perform this duty.
He felt now that he spoke the sentiments of
all the Liberals in the County of Carleton
when he said that, as sincerely as the Con-
servatives, sympathized with Canada on
the great loss suffered by the death of the
Right Honourable Sir John A. Macdonald.

The people of this County of all shades of
politics, are alike generous and sympathetic,
and would "wreath as soon as a wreath of
flowers" for as they would for a soul-bound friend.
They all, however, they may differ in
political views, stand uncovered in the pres-
ence of the great man who has fallen, and
politicians, but however different they may have
regarded some of his political methods, now
that he has fallen, that it may be said
of Sir John, as it was said of the Kings of Israel, "from
his shoulders upward he was higher than any
of the people." While he was a man of
high character, he was a man who was not
in Canada who in some lines of thought and
action were his equals, or, perhaps, his su-
periors, he would say to him in all
respect, there was not probably his equal in
Canada or the United States. This was an
honest tribute to a great man. Sir John
had for years been in Canada, and he had
been for years in Canada, and he had been
in control of other men and other minds
than the Czar in Russia, but while the Czar's
power was in trained battalions and a secret
police, the respect and submission rendered
Sir John, not in servile character, arose sponta-
neously from that sympathetic feeling
which true greatness and marked ability de-
mands.

He would in closing take upon himself
to say that the Liberals of Carleton County
most heartily endorse the sentiments of this
resolution, as well as the remarks he
had made as its seconder.

Mr. Cronkbiere said he had the honor of
speaking of the deceased Premier as one
of the great men of the Dominion. He knew, they
all knew, that Sir John A. Macdonald pos-
sessed a great mind. He was a man of
whom none ever lived, now lives or will live,
probably, possessing the same wonderful
power to hold control of the minds of other
men. In this tribute the men of the
of all the nations agree. From the time he
first entered upon public life, when 28 years
old, he displayed the ability to lead and the
power to control men as well as unflinching
courage in difficulty. At a time in Quebec
when he, the deceased, then a young man,
was engaged in attempting to quell the
flames, some one raised the alarm that there
was powder stored in the building; don't
spread that cry, said he, and cause needless
alarm; let us fight the flames, and he he con-
tinued to do so. His was a determined mind,
he saw the end from the beginning and rarely
failed to accomplish what he desired. See
that he has made Canada—what confederating
the old Provinces and then confederating
all the Provinces. Truly he was a great
man and few, with any feeling, could read
Mr. Laurier's tribute to his memory, without
a tear. As he had said, all people in
this County would agree with the terms of
this resolution.

Mr. Phillips rose to say that he endorsed
all that Mr. Drysdale had said about the
feelings of the Liberals in this County. Sir
John was a born leader of men, and his
regard his life had been no failure. He may
himself have got, as he may apparently have
got those who followed him, into tight
places, but never in so tight a place but that
he got out. It was cause for universal regret
that he passed away. Liberals would say
to Conservatives, we differ from you in po-
litical but we are one with you in sympathy
at the death of Sir John A. Macdonald.

The motion passed unanimously, and was
ordered to be engrossed and duly forwarded
to its destination.

On motion, Mr. Wm. McDonald, agent
for the road machine, was heard in the in-
terest. It had been tried successfully in
Jenstons and also in Arrostook Co. Mr.
Ketchum, M.P.P., had agreed to pay one
half the price of a machine for each Parish
in the County, from government money.
The price was \$250.

The Warden and several Councilors spoke
favorably of the machine. Mr. Harding, se-
conded by Mr. Melville, moved, that the
good experimental work that had been done
with one in his Parish, there
it was intended to buy one, the half price
required, to be taken from the highway fund.
The Warden desired, before adjournment,
to thank the members of the Board for the
unflinching kindness that they had shown him
while in discharge of his duties.

Council adjourned sine die.
