**PARSONS' PILLS**  
Make New, Rich Blood!  
In London, last year, 500 children under 10 years of age were arrested for drunkenness.  
The total number of immigrants landed at New York, the past week, was 17,116 the largest ever known for the same period.  
At Brest, in France, the yield of milk has been increased by giving the cows hot water to drink instead of cold. The increase is said to be one-third.  
E. D. Thayer, president of the Brandon, Vt., National Bank, had a cabinet containing \$100,000 in notes and mortgages stolen from his seat in a Rook Island sleeping car while coming into Chicago, Tuesday. No clue has been obtained as to the whereabouts of the stolen money.  
It is estimated that the amount of land under cereal crop, this year, in Manitoba, is 1,311,000 acres, of which 916,000 are in wheat.  
Thousands of cows wearing blue spectacles is a curious sight in Russia. Blue glasses were recommended because the reflection of the light upon the snow has been so blinding that most of thousands of cattle have been attacked with ophthalmia. According to a recent despatch from Vienna the entire supply of blue glass in Vienna has been exhausted for the purpose and it has been necessary to obtain additional supplies from Paris and London.  
The courts of Alexandria have sent to prison a man who made a good article of Egyptian mummies to order, with carefully prepared asses' skins. Not content with doing a good trade in kings and nobles, he undertook to fill an order for a few high priests, and his archaeological ignorance caused him to commit blunders that led to his exposure.  
The number of cattle in Australia is estimated at 8,600,000, an increase of more than 2,000,000 in the last fifteen years. Sheep have also increased from 60,000,000 to 90,000,000. The people of England view these figures with great satisfaction, inasmuch as they indicate an increased meat supply for the mother country.  
"Hammer and needle parties" are the latest fad in country towns in Indiana. Gentlemen are put to work sewing on buttons and ladies at knitting socks, and prizes are given to the most successful workers.  
The drought in the neighborhood of Nenah, Wis., is the worst ever experienced. Hardly anything will be raised this year.  
In the year 1870, when the telegraph was taken over by the British Government, the total revenue was £212,301. Five years later it had risen to £1,553,862. In 1880, it was £1,403,795; in 1885, £1,829,754; and last year it was £2,364,098.  
Heinrich Schmalinski, one of the millionaires of Hamburg, has decided to leave his immense fortune to his native city. The money, however, is to be used to build an asylum for unmarried women.  
This resolution was passed at the Anglican Synod of the diocese of Toronto the other day. "That, in the opinion of this synod, the drinking saloons are unmitigated evils, and that we pledge ourselves to use our utmost endeavors to secure the legislation which shall tend to the restriction and ultimate extinction of such saloons."  
Three splendid St. Bernard dogs, costing \$12,000, were landed at New York last night. One of them stands about three feet high.  
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The Oddfellows of Chicago, have decided to erect a great temple of their order in that city. It is to be located at the Northwest corner of Van Buren Street and Fifth Avenue. The building will cost \$1,000,000 and be sixteen stories high.  
The Toronto Heraldist conference has suspended for a year Mr. James Thompson for preaching the heresy that "There's no material hell, no punishment for wrongdoers but annihilation, and that sinners they would be punished with perpetual fire was illogical and unsupported by scriptural testimony."  
A Chinaman named Ti, at Bridgeport, Cal., killed a Plover, an Indian, out of the body up and pushed it to the most approved manner. Then he invited some Indians to a feast and served up the remains of Tom, which the red men greedily relished. When the feast was over the Chinaman went in search of Ti's scalp, but the Chinaman gave himself up to the authorities, and was acquitted on the plea of self defence. When Ti left the court the Indians got up behind him and carried him in pieces, beginning with an arm and finishing with his head.

**Drunkenness.**

The company then all pledged him again in the same extravagant bumper. He had no sooner swallowed than he fell upon the floor. Here, then, cried Socrates, describing the fatal effects of drunkenness, "this hero, unconquered by all the toils of prodigious marches, exposed to the dangers of sieges and exposed to the most violent extremes of heat and cold, here he lies subdued by his intemperance, and stricken to the earth by the fatal cup of Hercules."  
In this condition he was seized with a fever, which in a few days terminated in death. He was thirty years of age, and eight months old, of which he reigned twelve years. No one, says Plutarch, suspected that Alexander had been poisoned. The true poison which brought him to his untimely end, which has killed many thousands besides Alexander—  
Cyrus' Refusal to Taste Wine.  
A good old story is told of Cyrus, who, when a youth, undertook one day to be a cup bearer at the table of his grandfather, Cambyses. It was the duty of this officer to taste the liquor before it was presented to the king, and before he tasted it he gave the money, delivered the cup in a very graceful manner to his grandfather. The king observed the omission, which he imputed to thoughtlessness. "No," replied Cyrus, "I was afraid to drink; for not long since, as an entertainment which you gave, I observed that the lords of your court were drinking of it, became noisy and quarrelsome.
