



Being in narrow sections, it is admirably suited, from its free movements, for uneven sufaces in the ground; it is convenient to handle or move, and the draught is less than any other harrow used. It weighs 180 lbs

The harrow consists of four or more sections, each section complete in itself, and so connected with its fellow that no nut or key is necessary to take the section spart, which of itself saves a great deal of trouble and annoyance. It can be diminished in size by taking off a section, and enlarged by adding one or more to it, so as to suit circumstances. They cut eight feet wide.
