Right Hon A. J. Balfour has become first lord of the treasury and leader of the commons. He was born in 1848. and educated at Eton and Trinity College. Cambridge. He was private secretary to Lord Salisbury, his uncle, from 1878 to 1880. He was first elected to Strong, 136, besting G. H. Corbett, 123 parliament as member for Hertford in 1874 and sat for that seat till 1885. when he was chosen member for East Manchester, which seat he still holds. He was made secretary for Scotland in 1886, and more recently secretary for Ireland. His rapid promotion to a leading position in the cabinet is due in part to marked ability, but largely to aristoeratic family influence.
