





Literary Notices.

In Outing for November, wheelman Frank G Lens continues his description of his tour "Around the World with Wheel and Camera." The article is illustrated from instantaneous photos taken by Mr. Lenz, who is an expert thotographer.

Alexander Black, who is so frequent and welcome a contributor to the young people's magazines, is literary editor of the Brooklyn Times. He furnishes a paper on "The Babies of the Zoo" to the November WIDE AWAKE, and has made a careful and entertaining study of the young animals of the Central Park Menagerie. Scribner's Magazine for November contains the second of its group of preliminary articles on "The World's Fair," this one being an account of "Chicago's Part in the World's Fair," by Franklia MacVeagh, one of the prominent citizens of Chicego, who writes about the enterprise without any bias, frankly stating that he "has no connection with the World's Fair mansegment." Another notable article in this issue is the "Conversations and Opinions of Victor Hago," which Octave Uzanne, the famous French bibiophile and literary authority has complied from unpublished papers found at Guernsey, where the poet spent his exile. The seventh article in the series "Great Streets of the World" is a description of "The Grand Canal" of Venice by Henry James, whose wonderful prose style is exactly adapted to portray ing this picturesque street. The illustrations are by Zezzos, a skilful Italian artist. Fire at Milwaukee. MILWAUERE, Wis. Oct. 29 .- The city | 11 fire in its history. Four lives were lost and foor men injured. Dynamite was used but without effect Mighty billows of flame swept over blocks of buildings, leaving ruin and devastation in their wake. More than eleven blocks of solid territory, including much of the most extensive wholesale district is burned over. More than five hundred atoms dwalling houses cottages, barns, etc. stores, dwelling houses, cottages, barns, etc., have been burned out. With the destruction of the Fernecks building the backbone was broken, and a lone wall standing grimly at East Water and Andre streets marks the point where the firmes were stayed. A large num-ber of femities lost about all their household goods; others succeeded in loading their most valuable belongings on vehicles of all sorte and depositing them in places of safety. Assistance was sent to the city from Chicago

Racine and other points. Full 3 000 persons were made homeless by the configration. This is a very conservative estimate of the number who found themselves in the atreet last night, compelled to seek shelter under the roofs of hospitable citizens. The greater portion of losses tall upon poorer people, who carried little or no insurance. Hundreds of families lost everything, and do not know where they will eleep to night.

The wealthier portion of the community, however, are coming to their assistance. A mass meeting will be held to day to take measures for the relief of the homeless. The sum of \$5 000 has already been subscribed by the Democratic candidates for effice in Milwaukee county.
