TUTUSVILLE, Pa., June 6.—A scene of utter desolation is presented here this morning. Over two miles of property was destroyed, including railroads, factories, refineries, dwelling, etc. At present writing, it is estimated 100 persons have been either drowned or burned to death. The money loss is from \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000. The waters are slowly subsiding and thousands of people are in the streets searching for the of people are in the streets searching for the bodies of dead friends and relatives. The sum of \$25,000 has been contributed by citizens for the relief of the sufferers. The armory has been turned into a vast hospital and eating house. The streets about the different morgues and hospitals are thronged with heart broken people seeking for relatives.
