

Sir John Lubbock, Sir E Clark, Sir Henry James and Mr. Chaplin, president of the board of egriculture, unsuccessfully challenging replies from the liberal chiefs, who persisted in silence. Mr. Chaplain was frequently interrupted by ironical cheers and shouts of "Divide, divide." The house divided on Asquith's motion at midnight. The result was: For the motion, \$50; against it \$10. The opposite the motion, 350; sgainet it, 310. The opposition cheered loudly. Mr. Balfour moved that the house adjourn until Thursday next. The motion was agreed to. The concervatives then indulged in wild cheering. The Times says last night's vote resulted


