Communicated. After the Election. To the Editors of the Carleton Sentinel.

As a result of the Presidential Election of the 1st inst., there can be no doubt that, in due time, measures of tariff reform will be inaugurated and carried through.

There must necessarily, therefore, be quite an interval of time, yet, before the enactment of new tariff laws. It would be certain, however, that free trade, pure and simple, will not be advocated by any large number of persons.

It is reasonable to believe that the prohibitory features of the present law will be largely modified, and that can be done with but a loss of revenue, for with a lower duty there will be larger consumption of imported articles.

The free list undoubtedly will be enlarged in the interests of reform by putting on it coal, iron ore, lumber, and wool. The duty on potatoes will probably be placed again at the former figure for in this year of scarcity we find that the price, at retail, has advanced away out of reach of the means of the working people.

If these additions to the free list be made, the change will undoubtedly benefit the Province, but the greater benefit will be to our cities in giving us materials we want, and also intending to break down certain giant monopolies which have thriven under the tariff laws, a legacy of the war times.

Fast Steamers Wanted. To the Editors of the Carleton Sentinel: Would the Government of Canada purchase two steamers large and swift, specially fitted to carry farmers' produce, to run during winter between St. John or Halifax, and carry freight at cost; the one-half million dollars annually offered by the Government would do the whole business, to say nothing of other subsidies now annually paid to steamers which charge so much for freight that the farmer is lost before he starts. Better use this money in this way to lower freights to the English markets, so that the farmer can get a reasonable price, and not surrender this one-half million dollars a year, by paying to a huge monopoly to bring produce to them in carrying old country produce to Chicago, and what benefit will this mean?

Home Rule Bill. LONDON, Nov. 24. A report is current that the Cabinet has surrendered to Radical pressure and will introduce in Parliament a bill to reform the franchise before the Irish home rule bill is introduced. It is said that Mr. Gladstone relies upon persuading the Irish to accede to this course by showing that the financial proposals contained in the home rule bill cannot be successfully treated until the close of the financial year. The delay in the home rule bill is not, however, intended by the Government, but they will acquiesce, confident in their ability to overpower the government within a week after they become convinced that any treaty towards them is intended. The franchise bill will provide for a shorter period of residence to qualify voters and will otherwise simplify the suffrage qualifications. It will also facilitate the admission of new voters. The abolition of the plural voting system will be included in another bill to be introduced subsequently.

A Big Hunt. OMAHA, Nov. 24.—Several thieves entered the jewelry store of T. Johnson & Co., this morning, and succeeded in getting away with \$10,000 worth of diamonds and \$5,000 worth of gold watches. Johnson had stepped out of the store to get shared leaving only a watch repairer in charge. A man came in with a watch which he wanted repaired at once, and walked back with it to the repairer's bench. While the jeweler was at work the stranger stood in front of him, and so hid from view his confederate, who entered and filled a bag with watches and diamond rings. After the clock had been repaired the stranger left. It was a half hour before Johnson returned. Then the robbery was discovered. No trace of the men has been found.
