The following were among the judgments of the Supreme Court, at Fredericton, this week:

Ex parte Julius T. Gordon - R. Murphy moved for an order to remove jurisdiction made by the Police Magistrate of Woodstock for second offence against the Canada Temperance Act, on the ground that the defendant had not notice, having been called on Friday, 4th January. Summons were issued 21st October, and on 22nd October, trial took place before the magistrate on Friday, 4th November; rule nisi granted.

Perkins - Mr. Vanuier moved for rule nisi to bring up evidence for third offence against Canada Temperance Act, made by the police magistrate of Woodstock, on the ground that the defendant had not notice, having been called on Friday, 4th January.
