Some interesting figures regarding fruit culture in California are given by the Horticultural Bareau of that State. It is rather surprising to read that of the 155,980 square miles of land acre in the States only 400,000 acres are planted in fruit. Of these, 282,486 acres are in bearing trees, and 118,918 are in trees not yet in bearing. One fifth, or 82. 222 acres, are in raisin grapes, and 16,452 in table grapes. The raisin crop this year will be 55,000,000 pounds, or 15 per cent. more than the quantity of foreign raisins imported into the United States.
