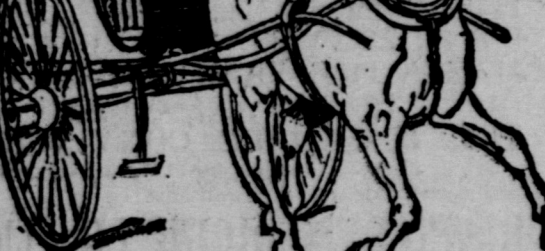

LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

We append report of a debate on this im-

Mr. Alward wanted to know why there

had been a change in this item. Formerly

roads and bridges.

Hon. Mr. Emerson said that it was pro-

posed to be changed in this item. Formerly

Commissioner's office, instead of having the

\$70,000 paid through the Provincial Secre-

tary's office as formerly.

Mr. Stockton said he had observed by the

Fredericton Herald, which was regarded as

the pocket organ of the Attorney General, a

statement that left the impression that the

Government intended to place the burden of

keeping up the roads and bridges on the

main roads.

Answering Mr. Alward, Hon. Mr. Em-

erson said he was not intended to lessen the

burden by-road purposes to any of the com-

munities in fact he could see no reason why

it might be necessary to increase them.

Mr. Shaw was glad to hear that there

was to be no change in the By-road ac-

count. There was no service so much ap-

preciated as the by-road service if the

money was properly expended. He thought

the by-road grant should be handled by com-

missioners appointed by the municipalities.

Mr. Baird hoped that in the distribution

of the money his county (Victoria) would

get a larger share than heretofore.

Mr. Hill spoke at length upon the im-

portance of taking into consideration the

question of improving the method of applying

the by-road money and the system of road-

making generally.
