And one man controlled the business. He made the common wooden chairs and pembroke tables with an occasional bedetead. His sales-rooms, office, etc., is in Town, on Queen st., in a building 25x60 feet, of four floors. in a building 25x60 feet, of four floors.— With all this floor capacity he is still cramp In 1879 Mr. Henderson put in his firet

Then the establishment furnishes large numbers of schools with desks and seats; churches with the necessary furniture and public halls with settees—Graham's hall has been or is about to be seated by Mr. Henderson—also public offices, banks, etc., with coreens, desks, etc.


