THE LOST KEY.

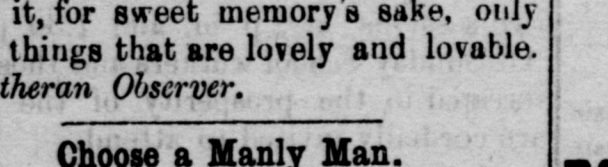

The building trade everywhere ought to realize great benefits from the removal of the tax on lumber.

The Senate bill removes the duties on logs, hewn and sawed timber, squared timber, sawed boards and planks, clapboards, shingles, shingles and shingles, and substantially everything in the McKinley wood schedule except furniture, the duty upon which is reduced to 25 per cent. The value of the import of these articles now placed on the free list was \$10,000,000 in 1893, and \$1,143,000 was paid in duties—Boston Herald.

The defeat of the evicted tenants' bill, in the English House of Lords, affects some 35,000 people in Ireland, who have been driven from their homes by their landlords because they refused to pay rents that were excessive and which have since their refusal been reduced by law. It is stated as a fact that in every instance where eviction was resorted to, by the landlords, the tenants were asked to let the rents be fixed by arbitration, and they offered to pay what has been judicially determined as a fair rent, but these requests were refused, and the evicted tenants are left on the roadside with but faint hopes of relief from the Government.

Local & Foreign News.

The Manitoba government's crops bulletin estimates the total yield of grain of all kinds at nearly 31,000,000 bushels.

The wheat yield of South Dakota, this year, is estimated at 100,000,000 bushels to the acre. It is the poorest year for crops since 1892.

A Grand Rapids (Mich.) dentist has the hypothesis power so strongly that he can perceive patients that they are swaying in a hammock and eating ice cream while he is at work on their molars. It may be superfluous to add that his skill is increasing rapidly.

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 23.—The long drought is most disastrous to farmers in this section. Their main reliance was on the corn crop, but this is now being ruined by the lack of rain. Potatoes will also fall short, probably 50 per cent. Corn and buckwheat are badly affected. Plums and peaches, however, are so plentiful that they will scarcely pay for the packing and shipping.

A Western genius has invented a machine for making gas for illuminating purposes out of wood, instead of coal. The machinery is very simple, consisting merely of a retort and purifying chamber, with a tank for holding the gas. He claims that the machine can be used for domestic purposes, and that by attaching it to an ordinary cooking stove enough gas can be had to light a room by the use of the machine to do the cooking—Scientific American.

The International Steamers have carried immense quantities of all kinds of berries from the Maritime Provinces to Boston this season. In the month of July the value of such produce, entered at the Boston custom house, was \$11,500, and every steamer from St. John still carries to carry large shipments, and will for some weeks to come. Some of these are for table consumption, but for the larger part are for making preserves, jams and fruit jellies.
