

Attornet General Olney played a trump cord in the game against silver when he, in relig to a formal request of the Secretary of the Tresport, delivered an official opinion the the elver cert ficates, millions of dellars worth of which ere in circulation throughout the country, are not lawful money in the meaning of the acts of June 20, 1874, and of July 12, 1882. It is putting the case very mildly to say that this opinion was a great surprise to seven-tenthe of the House and Senate, and that it aroused much indignation among the friends of silver, many of whom do not resitate to characterize it as another administration move for the further debasement of eilver. While the opinion of the Attorney General is not legally birding upon anybody, it necessarily has much effect upon Treasury officials in a matter of this sort. It is stated at the Treasury that it was because of the refusal of some of the national banks to accept silver certificates in exchange for ther paper money presented for redemption that Secretary Carliele asked the Attorney General to pass on the question. It is probable that steps will at once be taken by the triends of silver to make a test case for the courts. There is no doubt about the inten tion of Congress having been to make the s lver certificates lawful money, and it will require a decision of the Supreme Court to




