A Positive Denial

To the Editors of the *Carleton Sentinel*:
 Over the signature S. A. I receive a communication in your issue of the 24th inst. in which the writer makes very serious charges against me in my official capacity as Jailor of Carleton County. S. A. states that Scott and I have the entire run of the Gaol, Yard, Farm, and are allowed to run down around the shops at the corner for a chat as was the case when Wilbur was upped to be a cadet. This statement is most positive in every particular, for I must positively state that neither Wilbur nor any prisoner committed to Gaol since I had charge of the County Gaol was ever allowed to go down around the corner.

S. A. goes on to state that Oscar Dugan was allowed to take leave and visit his old haunts in the Town of Woodstock. This statement is false in every particular. Oscar Dugan, on the evening of the 10th inst., made his escape from the County Gaol and entered the Town of Woodstock and he has had the privilege of entering any building in said Town I had him under arrest and brought him back to Gaol.

S. A. goes on to state that it is your duty to keep under lock and key all prisoners placed in your charge.

With reference to the above, I would say I was not aware that that was my duty. The commitments which I receive state that I am to receive the prisoners and them safely keep, and does not say to lock them up. The instructions I received from the late Sheriff (who by law was really the Gaoler) when I was appointed some 24 years ago, was to give every person in custody all the liberty I could and keep myself safe.

The present Sheriff told me to carry out the instructions I received from the late Sheriff until I was instructed differently. When I receive different instructions I will obey them.

I think I am sure that I have answered all the charges made by S. A. as he has preferred against me, unless it is that I use the prisoners too well, but I don't think that the County wants me to lock up prisoners and starve them. If you want me to do different in that respect they had better prescribe a bill of fare, and I will use it if it doesn't exceed 30 cents per day.

Now, in conclusion, I would say that I challenge any man in Carleton County to prove any one of the charges S. A. makes against me to be correct.

A Contradiction.

I will proceed in this letter to finish an account of how the business is done at the stock yards, Chicago. A man needs to be actually upon the spot to judge even approximately of how business is carried on. The office work is mostly confined to the exchange building, where the stock yard company, the commission men, the railroad companies, the buyers, &c., have suitable offices. A substantial bank is in the same building. To the decision system of currency and weights the process of buying and selling is very easy from a financial point of view. The commission man takes say \$4.00 per hundred lb., the buyer bids \$3.80, and they eventually agree upon \$3.90 as the price; then the remainder of the work is very simple. Shortly after the terms are agreed upon, the cattle are driven to the scales and weighed. The scales have a capacity to weigh 100,000 lbs., but as a rule they seldom weigh more than 60,000 lbs. at a time.

By this means so immense a number of cattle are packed over one scale in a day. A trip through the big slaughtering houses is very interesting. The wonderful dexterity of the butchers, the mechanical inventions to help the men, the methodical system employed, the extreme cleanliness and, above all, the rapidity and silence with which every thing is done, strike a stranger very forcibly, and visiting persons visiting those great manufacturing concerns are away convinced that man's ingenuity in this respect has reached its limit. Although there are several companies doing business, there are four that are styled the big four packers, these are the Armour Co., the Anglo American Co., the Nelson Morris Co., and Swift Co. The first named company is only known to us in the East as pork and beef merchants, later on I will speak of them in another capacity. Some idea of the magnitude of the operations of this firm may be had from the following figures with reference to their yearly business. During the year 1891 the firm did a business amounting to \$55,000,000. The hog killed by this company numbered 1,000,000, cattle 700,000, sheep 400,000. The employees numbered 7,000 and the aggregate wage paid was \$3,600,000. The firm has 1,800 refrigerators cars. The total area covered by the buildings of the firm is fifty acres. When the visitor, all new to the business, enters the yards and packing town, gets inside of the main entrance his ignorance betrays him. He looks about and exclaims himself to the guide. The guide is a walking directory of the stock yards and he will place his entire stock of knowledge at your disposal for twenty-five cents. He is one of the few persons who has mastered the names of all the streets and avenues. The guide leads the visitor first to the gallery adjoining the Exchange restaurant. Here is a sight worthy to be seen; thousands of men dine at these restaurants. This gallery overlooks the great chaise board within the quarters of which there are swarms of cattle. The atmosphere is considered healthy. I noticed the employees were mostly all large men; the average weight of the packers is about one hundred and eighty pounds; one man whom they call Nick Baker weighs 250 lbs., and kills every day for Armour 5,000 hogs. Most all of the changing and driving of cattle, sheep and pigs is done on horse back, as is

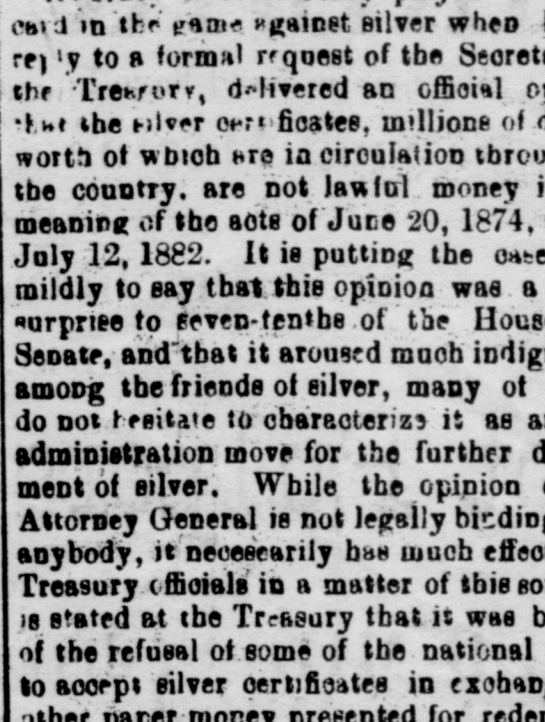
